Background

This document provides a high-level update of monthly implementation activities for the Environmental Sustainability Action Plan (ESAP). The ESAP is the City's strategic roadmap to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and enhance Redmond's natural resources for future generations.

The overarching ESAP priorities for 2021-2022 include:

- 1. Prioritize improvements to **city operations** as Redmond works towards the goal of carbon neutrality for city operations by 2030 in support of the Climate Emergency Declaration.
- 2. Advance **key sustainability priorities**, including those integrated into the 2021-2022 budget.
- 3. Leverage **partnerships and communications** strategies to engage the community and advance the ESAP goals and objectives.
- 4. Establish **foundational systems** and programs for the newly formed Sustainability Program.

Programmatic Updates

City Operations

- <u>City Fleet Electric Vehicle (EV) Charging Infrastructure</u>: Staff hosted an informational meeting with Puget Sound Energy in December to review site energy capacity and coordinate work schedules. Staff are currently developing a scope of work so the City can begin the contracting process.
- <u>Integrated Pest Management (IPM) Policy</u>: Staff formed an internal IPM committee during Q4 of 2021 to inform the development of a cross departmental IPM program and policy. The draft policy, which builds on the existing Parks Department program, is currently being circulated for internal comments. The policy is expected to be finalized and adopted by Q2 2022. *Climate Emergency Declaration objective

Key Priorities

- <u>Climate Vulnerability Assessment</u>: The draft Assessment and Climate Vulnerability Index are scheduled to be presented to the Environmental Sustainability Advisory Committee and Planning Commission on 1/27 and 2/8, respectively. The Vulnerability Assessment is scheduled to be presented to Council during the 2/22 Study Session. *Climate Emergency Declaration objective
- <u>Tree Regulations</u>: The proposed Tree Regulations and proposed Tree Definitions are currently under review by the Planning Commission. A Planning Commission Study Session is scheduled for 1/12, and the Planning Commission Report Approval is tentatively scheduled for 1/27.
- <u>High Performance Building/Green Building Standards</u>: The Overlake Incentive Package, which is being advanced through the Phase I Zoning Code Update, includes high performance building incentives and is being presented to Council in February. Lessons learned from these incentives will inform the comprehensive updates to the Green Building Incentive program which are currently in progress through the Phase II Zoning Code Update.

Partnerships & Communication

- Redmond Climate Action Challenge: The Climate Action Challenge now has more than 120 registered users. Targeted outreach is underway to support the development of Challenge teams and encourage greater collaboration and accountability through the platform. City staff are also in conversation with other Eastside cities to support the expansion of the platform to neighboring jurisdictions. - <u>Eastside Cities Heat Pump Collaboration</u>: Eastside cities have been in discussion with Spark Northwest, PSE, and other community partners to explore a collaborative residential energy conservation campaign, likely with an emphasis on heat pumps. Next steps include contracting with Spark Northwest, with a potential campaign launch in the spring or summer.
- Adopt-a-Drain: More than 151 drains were adopted by 94 community members during the first three months of the Adopt-a-Drain program. Approximately 411 pounds of debris were collected during this time. Community members adopt, name, and clear debris to promote cleaner waterways. Sustainability Program

- <u>Sustainability Newsletter</u>: Staff prepared and distributed the first Environmental Sustainability Newsletter (see page 3). The Newsletter was distributed to all Redmond residents and will be issued three times per year. The print newsletter was paired with a digital newsletter, which was sent to the more than 700 environmental sustainability listserv members. Sign up for the listserv at redmond.gov/Green-News.
- <u>Environmental Sustainability Advisory Committee (ESAC)</u>: The next meeting of the ESAC is scheduled for 1/27. The Committee will provide feedback on the Climate Vulnerability Assessment findings, the Redmond Climate Action Challenge, and priorities for 2022.
- <u>2023/2024 Implementation Planning</u>: The Sustainability Core Team is conducting preliminary resource and budget planning for the next budget cycle. The culmination of this work is tentatively scheduled to be presented to Council for feedback in March or April.
- <u>Sustainability Data Dashboard</u>: Staff continued development of the data dashboard platform, including testing data migration to the City's website and building out the user interface. *Climate Emergency Declaration objective

- Christmas Day, December 25
- New Year's Day, January 1

Because both Christmas Day and New Year's Day fall on Saturdays this year, residential garbage, recycling, and yard waste service will not be affected.

Waste Management Service and Weather Events

Cold weather is here, and with that comes winter storms. Below are some frequently asked questions about Waste Management service during inclement weather.

How will I know if my carts are going to be serviced?

Waste Management service alerts for Redmond can be found at wmnorthwest.com/redmond.

What do I do if my garbage is not collected?

You may put out double loads of garbage, recycling, and yard waste at no additional charge on your next regularly scheduled pick-up day.

Why is my garbage not being collected?

Winter storms can create unsafe and sometimes impassable road conditions that impact Waste Management's ability to safely provide collection service. With safety as the highest priority, the Waste Management operations team inspects every route so that, when it is safe to do so, collection will resume.



Free Curbside **Holiday Tree Collection**

If you are a residential customer with Waste Management, you can recycle your holiday tree at no cost. During the first two weeks of January, place unflocked trees up to six feet tall next to your yard waste cart (flocked trees must go in the garbage). After the first two weeks of January, trees must be cut into four-foot, or smaller, segments and placed fully inside your yard waste cart to be collected at no additional cost. 



City of Redmond Aims to Improve Local Streams Over the Next 100 Years

The City of Redmond's Watershed Management Program is an ambitious effort to improve the environmental health of all streams in Redmond over the next 100 years. A watershed is an area where rainfall and snowmelt drain to a specific stream, river, or lake. This program concentrates on protecting and improving the health of watersheds with actions such as retrofits to stormwater infrastructure, increased facility maintenance, restoration projects, outreach, and education.

The Watershed Management Program has identified and prioritized 20 watersheds throughout the city. One such area is the Monticello Creek Watershed located in the northeast corner of Redmond. Efforts in Monticello that have already begun include stormwater retrofits, educational programs, habitat restoration projects, and more.

Help Prevent Flooding and Pollution by Adopting a Storm Drain

Storm drains are the grates in the street into which rainwater flows and is carried out to our local streams, lakes, and rivers. Debris that builds up on the grates can fall into the drains and pollute our local waterways. If storm drains are completely clogged, the rainwater has nowhere to go, and flooding can occur.

How can you help? Sign up to Adopt-a-Drain today! It takes about 15 minutes, twice a month, to remove leaves, trash, and other debris from the top of the grate. (It is currently not available for businesses, schools, or other organizations.)

This is a recap of the 2021 Redmond Lights experience to PES.

OUTCOMES:

Traditionally, Redmond Lights brings the community together on municipal campus to celebrate diverse winter traditions through lights, art, performances, and a luminary walk. Starting in 2020, the event was reimagined to allow for COVID-19 safety protocols and to relocate the event for planned construction at the event site. These factors continued into 2021, and the event was again held as a month-long installation of art and light at Downtown Park that allowed the community to safely participate in a celebratory and joyful seasonal experience.

Event elements included:

- Art and light installations at Downtown Park December 1 January 5
- Blinker distribution through collaboration with local businesses
- Digital tour of art installations through STQRY app with artist information and details
- Participatory community experience including Kids' Coloring Contest and Home Lighting Contest
- Collaboration with local businesses for Business Window Decorating Contest
- Collaboration with Redmond Town Center through the lighting of Cleveland and 164th, window decorating, blinker stops, kids' coloring contest, and Santa
- People's choice voting for Business Window Decorating Contest and Home Lighting Contest

The following outcomes were achieved:

- 16 art installations at Downtown Park
- 35 days of lighting at Downtown Park and along Cleveland and 164th to Redmond Town Center
- 1 commissioned metal sculpture centerpiece designed to evoke the spirit of the traditional tree lighting on municipal campus
- 12 Sponsors (Microsoft, Redmond Town Center, Experience Redmond, Amazon, BECU, Evergreen Health, Sound Transit, Cascade Water Alliance, Cirque du Soleil Alegria, Puget Sound Energy, Marketplace Sotheby's International Realty, and HomeLight)
- 3,500 blinkers distributed through collaboration with 12 local businesses and organizations
- 4,754 digital tours through the STQRY app (3.5x increase over 2020)
- 10 local business entries into the Business Window Decorating Contest with over 565 community votes on Facebook (14x increase in participation over 2020)
- 611 entries into the Kids' Coloring Contest (2x increase over 2020)
- 1,582 community votes on Facebook for 16 Home Lighting Contest entries

BUDGET IMPACT:

Feedback from the community survey, customer service channels, and social media reflect support for the lighting and art installations at Downtown Park, as well as a particular interest in the Home Lighting Contest element. Participants have indicated that a spread-out installation felt safe and accessible during this time; however, in future years, feedback also indicates a desire to return to the luminary walk and oak tree lighting, as construction schedules and safety measures allow.



Attachment A:

The Parks & Trails Commission has recommended staff consider expediting a demonstration dog-park in Q3 of 2022 and prioritizing Community Garden expansion in 2023. Neither of these projects are in staff workplans or adopted budget. Both will be evaluated and prioritized in the PARCC Plan update and the 2023-24 Budget process, both of which are underway. The Parks & Human Services Committee was updated on these items, as part of a PARCC plan update, on November 1, 2021 and staff was asked to bring back an analysis on the feasibility of this recommendation and current workplan impacts.

The following details workplan impacts, and estimated costs for expediting a pop-up off-leash dog area in Q3 of 2022. Given the infeasibility of meeting the 2022 growing season, staff recommends community garden expansion be considered as part of the PARCC plan update and 2023-24 budget process that are currently underway.

2022 Workplan Considerations

Expediting the community garden expansion and off-leash dog area demonstration project in 2022 will affect ongoing work for both park planning and park operations and maintenance. Both of these amenities are noted as "mid-long term" (2022-2030) projects in the current, 2017 PARCC Plan, reflecting need for walkable park amenities near higher density neighborhoods.

Park Planning has multiple high-priority projects in 2022, including:

- **The PARCC Plan update**, which is our most important body of work and occurs every six years. This update includes analyzing community demand, existing park capacity and extensive community involvement, including surveys, focus groups, and events to understand priorities.
- **RCC III** will be in the design phase in 2022, which will include advertising and Request for Proposals (RFP), selecting an engineering firm and landscape architect and working through initial 30/60/90 percent design for the final 1.6 miles of trail.
- **Redmond Senior and Community Center** continues into 100% design and construction drawings. This project is the top priority of the community and requires a substantial commitment of staff time across both park planning and park operations.

• **Biennial Budget** Staff generates both capital and operating budget requests in winter/spring of 2022 and this effort requires significant staff time.

Park Operations winter workplan (which concludes in March 2022) is based on three priority factors identified in the PARCC plan:

- Maintaining a safe environment for park patrons
- Preservation/replacement of existing assets.
- ADA improvements by implementing the Parks and Trails ADA transition plan so all can use our facilities has been the third priority factor.

Current winter workplan items underway include work to preserve the Mackey Creek picnic shelter, Hartman Park asset preservation and trail work to assess/replace bollards.

Spring is the busiest time for park operations and maintenance as they work to ready all parks and trails across the system for higher use and on-board supplemental staff. An additional concern for Park Operations in 2022 is the supplemental hiring process and effects on timing and supply of seasonal staff. This hiring process also occurs in late winter/spring and would be impacted by expediting these projects.

Conclusion

Off-Leash Demonstration Dog Parks:

The earliest that a demonstration dog-park could be accomplished would be in mid-late summer 2022 (Q3). The expense, depending on location, is approximately \$50,000, which includes 438 staff hours for construction and maintenance.

Given this project is not included in the 2021-22 budget or workplan, it would result in impacts to park planning and park operations. Park Operations and Maintenance would need to defer 400+ staff hours from core and preventive maintenance of the park and trail system as construction projects are not part of the summertime program due to workload. This core work includes addressing safety issues, athletic field maintenance, urban forestry, trail maintenance, irrigation, and preventative maintenance/asset management.

In addition, the materials and supplies budget would be impacted with purchase of approximately \$20,000 of materials (depending on final site) that includes fencing, gates, trash receptacles, surfacing, dog waste receptacles and similar items. This would impact supplies used in the core routine

maintenance above and includes things like lumber, concrete, irrigation parts, splash pad supplies, soil, mulch, trees, trail surfacing and similar materials.

Also, Park planning would need to conduct site specific outreach around candidate sights in parallel with the development of the PARCC plan and its associated outreach. This has the potential to duplicate outreach efforts.

Community Garden Expansion:

Given the existing workplan commitments in the spring of 2022, staff resources do not allow for garden expansion in time for the 2022 growing season. Community garden expansion should be considered during the 2023-24 budget process and workplan development. PARCC plan outreach could further gather community input and desires so the additional plots can be targeted toward communities with the most need, ensure ADA accessibility and result in efficient use of resources.



CITY OF REDMOND ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF REDMOND, WASHINGTON,
AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 3026, 3041, 3042, 3045, 3046, 3047, 3048, 3049, 3050, 3051 and 3069 BY MAKING ADJUSTMENTS TO THE CITY'S 2021-2022 BIENNIAL BUDGET, IN EXHIBIT 1.

WHEREAS, the City Council approved the proposed schematic design, the project budget of \$44.0 million, and the funding plan in concept for the Redmond Senior and Community Center at its July 20, 2021 Regular Business Meeting;

WHEREAS, the City Council appropriated \$17.116 million in funding for the Redmond Senior and Community Center in the 2021-2022 Adopted Budget;

WHEREAS, additional funding of \$26.884 million in funding was appropriated by the City Council for the Redmond Senior and Community Center project at its November 1, 2021 Regular Business Meeting to increase the total project appropriation to \$44 million; and

WHEREAS, additional funding of \$4.0 million needs to be appropriated by the City Council for the Redmond Senior and Community Center project, thereby increasing the total project budget to \$48.0 million, to increase the total project appropriation to \$48 million to align with based on the recently

completed 60% design cost estimate, which reflects current and market conditions.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF REDMOND, WASHINGTON, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Ordinance No. 3026 adopting the 2021-2022 biennial budget, passed by the City Council on December 10, 2020, and as amended by Ordinance No. 3041, Ordinance No. 3042, Ordinance No. 3045, Ordinance No. 3046, Ordinance No. 3047, Ordinance No. 3048, Ordinance No. 3049, Ordinance No. 3050, Ordinance No. 3051 and Ordinance No. 3069, is hereby amended to set the total project budget at \$48 million for the Redmond Senior and Community Center and to appropriate an additional \$4 million to fully fund the project.

Section 2. Severability. If any section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance should be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity of any other section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance.

Section 3. Effective date. This ordinance shall take effect five (5) days after passage and publication of an approved summary thereof consisting of the title.
