Statement of Interest – Poet Laureate Application

Nancy Mburu

My name is Nancy Mburu, and I am a poet and author based in Seattle. My creative work is rooted in the immigrant experience and often explores themes of the African diaspora, cultural identity, and womanhood. I am drawn to the Poet Laureate role because I believe poetry has the power to foster belonging, celebrate cultural richness, and reflect a city's evolving spirit. I would be honored to serve as Redmond's Poet Laureate to uplift the voices of its residents, celebrate its diversity, and inspire collective reflection through poetry.

I earned my degree in Creative Writing from the University of Washington Tacoma and have been an active contributor to Washington's literary and arts community ever since. I served for three years as a Fiction and Poetry Intern at Hugo House, where I helped organize monthly readings and participated in a creative cohort. Later, as a Hugo House Writer-in-Residence, I worked under the guidance of a mentor, collaborated with other writers, and helped host public events. My work has been featured at events like Stage Fright and Creative Colloquy, where I performed poems such as *The Tourist*, *Chains of Justice*, and *Pandemic*, which explore cultural appropriation, racial injustice, and the emotional toll of the pandemic.

I have also collaborated on multi-genre projects, including *Alama* (2019), a three-episode web series created with other African artists in Seattle. The series follows a young immigrant actor navigating identity, dreams, and diaspora in America. Projects like this reflect my passion for complex, culturally grounded storytelling.

My poetry has been shared in spaces of healing and empowerment, such as Travel to Prevail, a women's conference where I performed *I Am Woman* to honor the strength of immigrant women. That same year, I was invited as a guest speaker at a spoken word poetry class at UW Tacoma, where I lectured on performance techniques, gave feedback on student work, and shared my poem *Chains of Justice*.

I have also been shaped by residencies at Jack Straw Cultural Center and Mineral School, where I deepened my creative practice, published a chapter of my forthcoming book *Sauti* (which means "voice"), recorded podcasts, and participated in public readings. Most recently, in my role as a Communications Consultant with the Washington State Office of Equity, I create inclusive content that reflects the realities of communities

across the state. This work continues to strengthen my commitment to equity-driven storytelling and inclusive public engagement.

As Redmond continues to grow, embracing its diversity, innovation, and natural beauty, it deserves an artistic voice that can both witness and shape its journey. Through poetry, I hope to celebrate its green spaces and technology hubs, its rooted histories and future aspirations.

I believe poetry belongs everywhere: in parks, libraries, classrooms, and public spaces. As Poet Laureate, I will help make poetry a living, breathing part of Redmond, accessible to all and reflective of all.

Thank you for considering me for this opportunity to listen, uplift, and write in service of the city's heart.


