Project Purpose and Methodology



- Project goal is to measure general satisfaction with Redmond City government and residents' priorities for future planning and improvements
- Survey of Redmond residents conducted March 14 April 14, 2024
- Like the 2023 survey, the 2024 survey universe includes all residents, using a randomized Address-Based Sampling (ABS) approach
 - This results in some small differences versus surveys conducted prior to the 2023 survey
- ▶ A total of 547 interviews were conducted; margin of error ± 4.2 percentage points at the 95% confidence interval
- Survey offered in English, Spanish, Chinese, and Hindi but 99% of respondents completed it in English
- Where applicable, results are compared to past Redmond Community surveys


Quality of Life and Priorities

Ratings for quality of life have remained stable over the past few years. However, there has been a slight decrease in positive ratings since the previous year.






Top-of-Mind Positives



Accessibility, scenery and parks, and safety continue to be residents' favorite top-of-mind things about living in Redmond.




Top-of-Mind Concerns

Top-of-Mind Concerns Over Time



Mentions of crime as a top concern have steadily increased, while growth/overdevelopment is a concern to a smaller share of residents than in previous surveys.




Number One Priority

What do you think should be the City of Redmond's number one priority over the next two years?








City Ratings and Priorities


City of Redmond's Current Priorities



Consistent with last year, nearly nine out of ten residents of Redmond agree with the four guiding statements as the city's top priorities.

The City of Redmond uses four guiding priority statements when determining how your tax dollars should be spent. These statements say that the programs, initiatives, and priorities the City will fund should be:


- (1) Strategic and Responsive We value a city that is welcoming, service oriented, and fiscally responsible
- (2) Healthy and Sustainable We value a healthy environment that supports an active community
- (3) Safe and Resilient We value a thriving community where all people feel safe
- (4) Vibrant and Connected We value a well-planned and supported community that provides a sense of place



City of Redmond Job Ratings



Half or more of residents rate the job the City of Redmond is doing overall, keeping community members informed, and delivering services as "excellent" or "good."




City of Redmond Overall Job Rating – Trend



The City's overall job rating has declined since 2023, returning to 2021 levels, while negative ratings are at an all-time high.




City Services Gap Analysis

City Service/Function Importance Ratings



Protecting drinking water, emergency and police services, and maintaining parks, trails and open spaces are rated highest in importance among Redmond Residents.





City Service/Function Performance Ratings



The City's overall performance rating (3.5 over 5) is on par with most services. Performance ratings are higher for fire/EMS, parks/open space, drinking water, providing community events, and protecting our natural environment, and are lower for providing services for pedestrian safety, people in need, and utilizing community feedback in decision making.



Gap Analysis: Performance as Percentage of Importance



Areas where the City underperforms importance include its use of community feedback, managing police services, pedestrian and bike safety, and maintaining public infrastructure and facilities. Most other services have a performance rating equivalent to their importance, but the City exceeds service importance in providing community events and recreation programs.



Gap Analysis - Trend



The "gap" is a measure of how well the City is doing based on community members' perceived importance. Changes are driven by changes in perceptions of importance and/or performance; **the closer to 100% the gap is, the better**. The most significant change since 2023 is the decline in performance around utilizing community feedback.




Public Safety

RFD & RPD Job Ratings




Majorities rate the performance of both the RFD and RPD positively, although four-in-ten residents give the RFD an "excellent" rating, indicating a more intense positive perception.



RFD & RPD Job Ratings Over Time



Ratings for both the RFD and RPD have remained mostly consistent. However, "poor" ratings for the RPD have increased slightly since 2022.



Safety in Redmond



Strong majorities feel safe in Redmond and walking alone in their neighborhood. While total safety is consistent with last year, the share of those who feel "very" safe in Redmond has decreased since 2023, with a majority of those who feel less safe moving to "somewhat" safe.




Public Safety Resources & Upgrades



Over two-thirds see it as important to increase public safety resources overall. Top resources include crisis response by behavioral specialists, help for homeless community members, and mobile health services for vulnerable residents.


Thinking about public safety resources, please indicate how important each of the following items is to you and your household?

Findings Summary



- The quality of life in Redmond continues to be perceived positively by most of its residents.
- Redmond residents continue to give high marks to the City for fulfilling its core responsibilities, including delivering services effectively. However, dips in some job ratings suggest current events may be impacting perceptions of the City.
- Ratings for most city services and functions have remained consistent with past surveys.
- Concern around crime has steadily increased and is now the top issue residents would like to see the City focus on over the next couple of years.
- While most residents feel that Redmond is a safe place to live, some believe improvements could be made to public safety resources. These sentiments are not very intense, but there is a particular need for crisis response to 911 calls involving behavioral specialists.

March 2022 to November 2022: What Changed?



This survey tested recall of the November 2022 vote; when those who refused to answer are included in the "No," we get a result of 47% Yes and 53% No which mirrors November 2022.

Key Influences from March to November 2022

- Measure language tested in March 2022 did not include the 5% annual increase on the November ballot.
- In March 2022 we highlighted the unpredictability of the economy and inflation. Economic concerns rose along with inflation throughout 2022; this clearly did not pair well with the added 5% increase language.
- There was an active No campaign, with a former Mayor in opposition via editorials and the voter pamphlet, claiming the measure was a large tax increase at an inflationary time, while also insisting the City either had the money or needed to consider other options before asking for a tax increase.
- The Yes campaign likely reached voters only once with information; not enough to hold support.
- While the March 2022 poll showed a majority in favor, only 35% strongly supported the measure and 32% leaned in favor; a majority of this group was clearly swayed to vote against it.
- Our poll did not test on any negatives because it was not a campaign poll; instead, it established the theoretical ceiling for the proposal.

2022 - Reasons to Approve or Reject Measure



Sentiments against the measure largely revolved around high costs and taxes, with nearly a majority offering that as the best reason to vote no. Clearly this message resonated.
