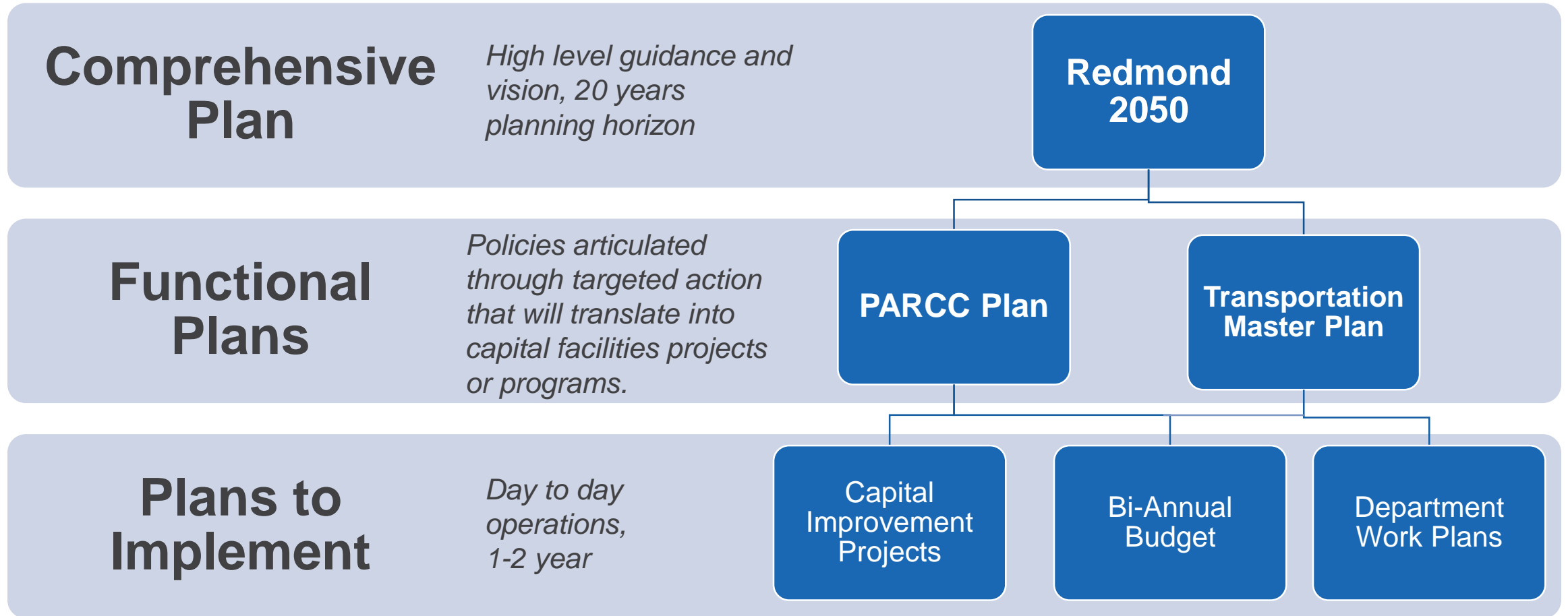

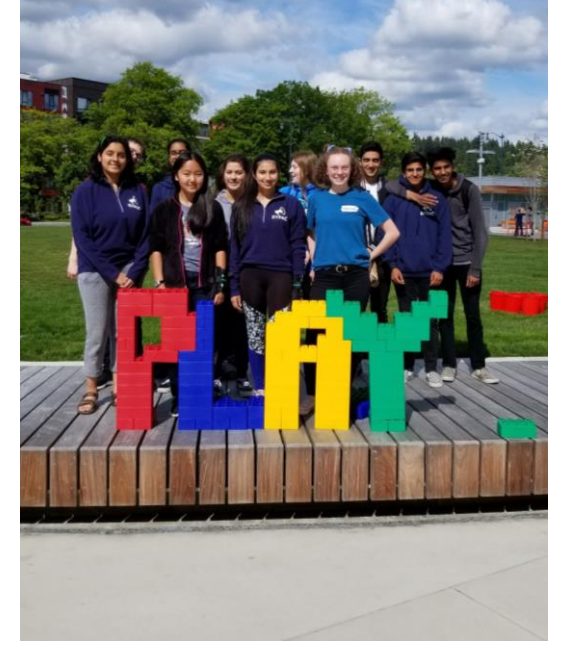

Basis for Capital Planning

2017 PARCC Plan: Baseline project list: carry forward unfinished projects.

City Budget: Account for budgeted projects, especially multi-year projects.

New Projects from Community: Expand project list to add new project ideas to address community interests and reflect system needs.

Staff & Commission Coordination: Review to ensure completeness and relevance

* CIP is not an official budget and intended as a guiding document for City staff in the preparation of departmental budgets.

Expand Capacity: Park, trail & community center development & acquisition

Lifecycle Project: Renovation of existing facilities or asset replacement

Non-Capital & Planning Projects: Master or strategic plan, recreational programming (not on CIP list)

CIP Topline Recommendations

Near-term (6-yr) Projects: Develop existing park ownership, expand trail network, open RSCC, system-wide renovations & upgrades

Long-term (7-20 yr) Projects: Develop East Redmond Corridor, develop urban plazas, develop community center, expand trail network, additional park renovations & upgrades

Non-Capital & Planning Projects: Park site master plans, energy efficient lighting, Environmental Sustainability Action Plan support, tree canopy expansion, emergency response locations plan for trailheads and parks, Public Art planning and programming

CIP Topline Recommendations

Near-term (6-yr) Projects: Develop existing park ownership, expand trail network, open RSCC, system-wide renovations & upgrades

Expand Capacity, Parks:

- Community garden expansion
- Demonstration dog park
- Neighborhood and urban park/plaza acquisitions
- SE Redmond Neighborhood Park development
- Additional park development

- Plan for the future of community space in Marymoor Village, Overlake Community Center, and Old Firehouse Teen Center



CIP Topline Recommendations

Near-term (6-yr) Projects: Develop existing park ownership, expand trail network, open RSCC, system-wide renovations & upgrades

Expand Capacity, Trails:

- Complete RCC Phase 3
- East Redmond Corridor acquisitions
- Trailhead enhancements – shelters, tables, benches, bike racks, drinking fountains, restrooms



CIP Topline Recommendations

Near-term (6-yr) Projects: Develop existing park ownership, expand trail network, open RSCC, system-wide renovations & upgrades

Lifecycle Projects, Renovations :

- Meadow Park & Reservoir Park sport court resurfacing
- ADA Improvements – restrooms, parking lots pathways
- Anderson Park hardscape & facility repairs
- Idylwood Park restroom and concession building
- Hartman Park Turf & Playground Replacement
- Turf Replacement – multisport lines

Non-Capital & Planning Projects: Park site master plans, energy efficient lighting, Environmental Sustainability Action Plan support, tree canopy expansion, emergency response locations plan for trailheads and parks, Public Art planning and programming

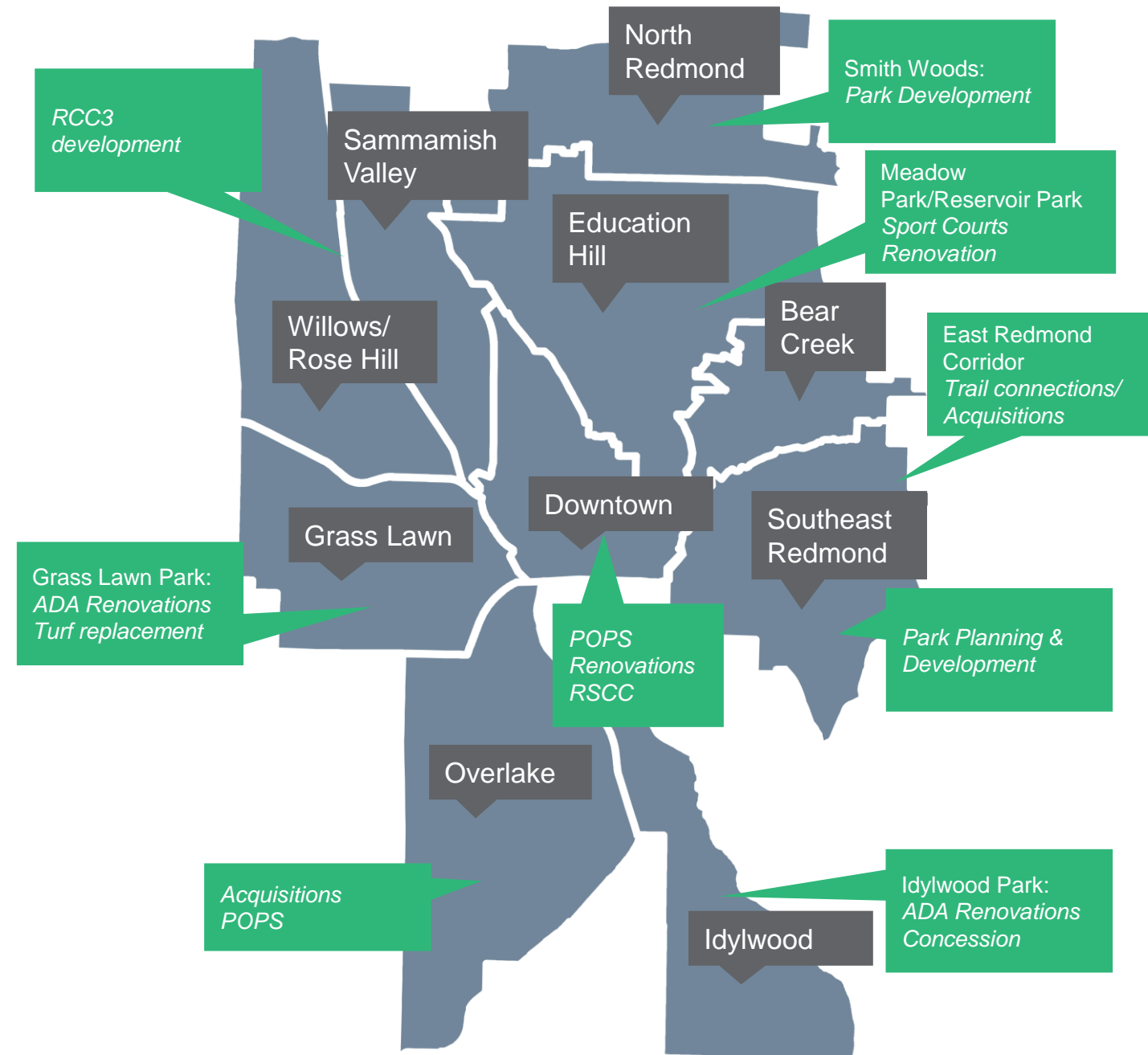
