Hello,

My name is Daniel Achterman, and I've been a Redmond resident for nearly 15 years. Recent protests inspired me to look into how Redmond invests in public safety, so I reviewed last year's budget and was generally quite pleased. I'm happy that the city has specific metrics for measuring success, and invests in programs like housing services and youth programs.

I do have four questions I'd like to submit for consideration, about how we could better measure success, and about what impact we would see from investing more in some services. Thank you so much.

- Safety satisfaction ratings in the citizen survey are broken down by gender and age group, but
  not by racial demographic groups. Can we analyze survey results to see if different race groups
  perceive their safety in the community differently? It seems like we should target all groups
  feeling safe in the city, instead of using an average that may hide dissatisfaction in
  underrepresented communities.
- 2. Housing and Human Services is only aiming to house 60% of outreach participants, but there are no funding proposals to increase spending in this category to target increasing those results. Perhaps I'm misunderstanding the success metrics, but what would be the likely outcomes of investing more heavily in Housing and Human Services? It's currently only 1% of the city budget, and just 1/10th of police spending.
- 3. What metrics are being used to evaluate the success of the Community Court pilot, which is aimed at helping low-risk misdemeanor offenders outside the traditional court system? If the program is currently successful, what would be the possible impacts of increasing funding of it? Criminal Justice Services are currently only 1% of the city budget.
- 4. The performance measures for Police Emergency Services are crime rates and percentage of citizens in the survey who say they are satisfied with police and feel safe. But most citizens don't interact with police, and thus don't have an informed view of their performance, and many factors influence "feeling safe" beyond just the police. How can we more directly measure the success of police, and how can we better identify areas the police should aim to improve? Should their performance measures include statistics like number of complaints against officers?

Dear City of Redmond Mayor and Council,

The City's process of budgeting by priorities and engaging residents in the budget process is admirable, and I hope we will continue to budget by the community's priorities now and into the future. City budgets have tremendous impact on the lives and wellbeing of residents, and cities have the responsibility to make sure those impacts are equitable. City budgets are not equitable by default, so we must put in the work to make them equitable.

My requests to help bring equity to the city's budget are as follows:

- 1. Establish an indicator of racial equity for all city budget priorities
- 2. Expand the indicators of the safety priority to include the social safety net

Many people in this country are awakening to and reckoning with the realities of systemic racism perpetuated through the policies and practices in established institutions, resulting in the exclusion or promotion of designated groups. Systemic racism need not have an individual malicious intent, but its outcomes negatively affect those groups not in power. Predatory lending, police brutality and disparate health outcomes in communities of color emanate from systemic racism.

Municipal budgets are not exempt from systemic racism. In a budget, racism can look like inequitable infrastructure and education investments, over-policing and under-serving vulnerable members of our community, and locating noxious or hazardous uses in poor and minority neighborhoods. In order to avoid inequitable outcomes of budgets, cities must actively reflect and engage in work to improve equitable outcomes.

Redmond's six priorities for our budget are well-considered; however, reading through the 2019-2020 adopted budget there is little mention of equity, and none of race. With the new budget cycle beginning, this is an excellent opportunity for Redmond to add measures of racial equity to all of the budget priorities, not just the diverse and connected community and responsible government priorities.

I would like to speak particularly to the budget priority of safety. For the 2019-2020 budget, the indicators of safety all surround law enforcement and fire services. Safety deserves a broader set of indicators. It need not be solely a matter of law enforcement. What about the social safety net of our community?

Improvements in human service outcomes deserve a place in the safety priority. It is a measure of safety that a family does not lose their housing when an income is lost. It is a measure of safety that everyone in Redmond has food security. It is a measure of safety that people of all backgrounds feel welcomed and included in this community. With such a narrow list of safety indicators in Redmond's current

budget allocations, it is not surprising other department programs do not offer proposals related to this budget priority. By expanding the city's understanding of safety and adding an indicator of the social safety net to this priority, other programs can seek much needed funding.

Please pursue equity in budgeting by establishing an indicator of racial equity for all city budget priorities and by expanding the indicators of the safety priority to include the social safety net.

I have two initial recommendations for this budget cycle, both of which entail addition of FTEs. Given the current constraints due to reduced City revenue, I suspect that they may be difficult to accommodate but perhaps the functions could be incorporated within existing staff resources.

<u>TDM Assistant</u> - I note that one of the positions that might remain vacant in the modified current budget is a TDM assistant. If Redmond is going to pursue a greenhouse gas reduction strategy that targets auto emissions (as may be a Climate Action Plan recommendation by the Environmental Sustainability Stakeholders), additional resources may be needed. Alternatively, tasking GRTMA with more emphasis on cutting single occupant vehicle usage by the community at large might be appropriate.

<u>Communications Administrator</u> – This position was proposed as Offer #65 in the previous budget but went unfunded. Please see my statement of support of that Offer provided most recently in my September, 2019 response to the Strategic Plan Community Survey as extracted in the attached document.

#### **Community Engagement/Outreach – Development Awareness**

Better communication coverage of development projects in Redmond and the opportunity for the community to "influence City policy and direction" is a long standing need that deserves to be addressed as a stand-alone element of the Strategic Plan. Citizen Surveys consistently list transportation and growth/overdevelopment/overpopulation as their top concerns, yet it is difficult to perceive responsiveness to public comments on these critical topics. The following is adapted from testimony germane to this glaring Strategic Plan flaw that I provided to the Council in the context of the last budget cycle:

To quote the Community Involvement Consultant Findings presented to the Council on November 27, 2018, the "Community Poll top response (65%) was not being certain that giving their input matters in decision-making." I have to say that, with the exception of tree canopy, that has certainly been my experience in dealing with the City of Redmond for over six years. The accountability and transparency of public process in Redmond would be much more evident if there is actual two-way dialogue rather than soliciting public comment on land use and budget issues which are then listed on a matrix and not addressed in substance.

As the Consultant Findings state, the City does great on the "fun stuff" but has weaknesses where the "hard stuff" is concerned to include "closing the loop after community provides feedback and communicating how public input will be used in decision making." Further, a staff poll in the same report states that inputs are "most often shared with Council vs. sharing back with the community" and that there is internal confusion over who is leading public engagement. (See also recommendations in the Redmond Community Involvement Guidebook, page 2, particularly item 7 "Community members should know how their input and feedback was used in the decision-making process.")

These findings justified my strong recommendation that the Communications and Marketing Administrator position proposed in Offer #65 (Community Engagement/Outreach portion of Diverse & Connected Community) be created and funded. To whit "The need for all City Departments to engage more effectively, dynamically and innovatively with the public is consistent with feedback received from the community and the City Council. This additional position will provide the community with neighborhood outreach and project-specific engagement for the Overlake, Downtown and Marymoor Village neighborhoods....This will allow the City to have one main point of contact both internally and externally for communication." Filling this position would assist the Planning Department (who does the minimum amount of required public notification) and supplement the Communication Division's historical emphasis on "softer" communications announcements that focus on matters of Citywide interest. (For example, much could be learned from the public comment process regarding the proposed Seritage development.) As suggested in the Offer and in the above findings on community involvement, such an emphasis is overdue.

Beyond the staff communications function, the Council, as the public-facing portion of Redmond's leadership, needs to be more dynamic and interactive in responding on-the record to matters addressed in public comment. I know that Council members recognize this issue based on entries in the last

budget "parking lot" and on remarks when the community engagement report was received. I have similarly provided (unaddressed) inputs on how Council Procedures/Public Participation could be improved, to include use of the ombuds function beyond "customer service."

For the 2019-2020 budget, the indicators of safety all surround law enforcement and fire services. Safety deserves a broader set of indicators. It need not be solely a matter of law enforcement. What about the social safety net of our community?

Improvements in human service outcomes deserve a place in the safety priority. It is a measure of safety that a family does not lose their housing when an income is lost. It is a measure of safety that everyone in Redmond has food security. It is a measure of safety that people of all backgrounds feel welcomed and included in this community. With such a narrow list of safety indicators in Redmond's current budget allocations, it is not surprising other department programs do not offer proposals related to this budget priority. By expanding the city's understanding of safety and adding an indicator of the social safety net to this priority, other programs can seek much needed funding.



Please pursue equity in budgeting by establishing an indicator of racial equity for all city budget priorities and by expanding the indicators of the safety priority to include the social safety net.

Dear Mayor Angela Birney, Chief Darrell Lowe and Redmond City Council Members:

I am astonished that at this time in history our very well funded police department has not made it a priority to implement body and dash cams for officers.

The Redmond police's website cites two primary reasons for this: lack of funding and cost of monitoring it to preserve privacy. I believe - and studies show - that the benefits far outweigh the cost, especially in relation to improving trust of Redmond citizens in our police and making officers accountable for their behavior. In terms of privacy, the ACLU does a good job of reviewing the risks and protocols that can be put in place to protect the public (<a href="https://www.aclu.org/sites/default/files/assets/police\_body-mounted\_cameras.pdf">https://www.aclu.org/sites/default/files/assets/police\_body-mounted\_cameras.pdf</a>).

A third justification is how it often assists in shining a light on and unraveling the sequence of events and facts in complex cases.

Additional benefits cited in research are, "[...] a surveillance tool to promote officer safety and efficiency and prevent crime." (https://www.ncjrs.gov/pdffiles1/nij/252035.pdf)

In addition there are significant unexpected benefits which were noted, such as increased community contact by police.

Given the need for transparency in policing, I do understand that policing is complex, and that officers may feel the burden of increased scrutiny with cameras. Police encounters can be subject to different interpretations. Ariel discusses many of the difficulties in drawing conclusions and designing studies that can effectively parse out the effect of body cam usage on public perception, on police use of force, and on complaints of police misconduct by the public.

Body cams and dash cams need to be accompanied by careful police hiring practices, as well as education and training to use them effectively. Policing is a hard enough job, and we need to lift up and support our officers, demonstrate how body and dash cameras can benefit them, while also increasing community trust and holding them responsible for their actions.

I believe the time has come for the City Council of Redmond, it's Mayor and Police Chief Darrell Lowe to seriously consider the implementation of body and dash cams for our police department and initiate a town hall type discussion that includes police officers, residents, our city leaders and council members.

## Public Hearing Testimony on Redmond's Preliminary 2021-22 Budget by Tom Hinman, October 20, 2020

Good Evening Mayor and Council Members -

Let me first acknowledge the challenges ahead of Redmond as revenues have declined and services have been discontinued as result of Covid-19. The reduction in staff is appalling as a result, but I hope that those services and activities can be resumed as the earliest possible moment. Accordingly, some of my recommendations may not be feasible for implementation in the near term. I request that these comments remain available for future reference and incorporated when appropriate.

I have appended my comments in the 2019-20 budget cycle two years ago with annotations where progress is evident but also to where attention is still warranted in dealing with Environmental Sustainability, Community Engagement and the development of Overlake. As a general comment, I support both the Urban Forestry and Environmental Sustainability budget offers and urge strong enforcement of measures proposed.

There are four overarching areas to which I invite your attention:

<u>Carbon Reduction and Tracking</u> – Moving Redmond to a carbon neutral position by 2030 demands close attention to green-house gas (GHG) sources and mitigation – the critical need driving Redmond's Environmental Sustainability Action Plan. GHG emission totals are Program Measures cited in Environmental Sustainability and Solid Waste Management. By implication, mobility improvements (mode shift from single occupant vehicles, TDM/CTR and bike-ped programs, Walking Schoolbus, shift to alternate fuels in the City fleet, etc) all contribute to GHG reduction, not just less traffic congestion. Where and how are these improvements captured? Those mobility dots need to be connected and target GHG reductions established as performance measures.

<u>Resiliency</u> - Clarification is appropriate in use of the term "resilient." There are two ways to view this topic, both of which have resource implications. The first is more like Emergency Preparedness (flooding/drain clearance, ice/snow removal, wildfires, pandemics and community/business recovery) with the human dimension of training and coordinated operational response as is evident under Safe & Resilient. I note there that an Emergency Management Programs Coordinator is unfunded.

The second component is care of the natural systems (augmented by built stormwater infrastructure) and is addressed within the Healthy & Sustainable proposals. I note that a Senior Engineer position was contained in that budget offer (but not funded) with responsibilities for "implementing restoration projects and developing comprehensive policies around resiliency and habitat enhancements in support of the Sustainability Plan". Both of these important positions should be reconsidered when possible.

<u>Ground & Surface Water Management and Stormwater Management</u> – Related to Resiliency comments above are natural system improvement programs that can reduce flooding by caring for Redmond's watersheds. Both of these budget offers contain unfunded entries like volunteer plantings, in-stream flow control, environmental and post-project monitoring that bear upon both potential flooding and overall health of Redmond's natural environment. I hope some of these functions can be accommodated within existing staffing until the programs can be renewed.

<u>Citywide Communications and Community Outreach & Involvement</u> – Strategic and Responsive Objective #2 is to "connect with the local and regional community through broad and inclusive communication and public engagement strategies." I applaud this emphasis and the new Community Satisfaction Rating that accompanies it which builds on some Performance Measures in the last budget cycle. The Environmental Sustainability budget offer plus the Executive Leadership and City Council offers also rely upon engagement and outreach for effective response to community aspirations. Cross-program coordination is essential.

As a related matter, I recommend another Program Measure under the Development Services offer related to outreach regarding new project proposals. The number of community responses to Invitations for Public Comment or attendance at project meetings is an indicator of public outreach effectiveness within the Planning Department and should be added.

Further, I would expand City Council Program Measures beyond the percentage of Ombuds issues acknowledged, closed and reported within established time frames. I recommend some metric for the number of public comments received on policy/program matters and inclusion of a citizen voice on future updates to Council Procedures.

# <u>Annotated Extracts</u> from 2018-20 Proposed Budget Testimony by Tom Hinman – October 16, <u>2018</u>

(update annotations are in **bold** and labeled "**TH 2020 Comment**" to accompany my public comments of October 20, 2020)

Good Evening Mayor and Councilmembers -

My comments on the draft budget this evening will focus on three topics about which I have spoken on many occasions – Environmental Sustainability, Community Engagement, and the development of Overlake.

#### Clean & Green

For the benefit of new faces on the dais and as a reminder to those old hands, when sustainability was raised as a community value highlighted in the *Livable Redmond Conversation* of November, 2010 and captured in the ensuing Redmond Comprehensive Plan of 2030, yours truly was Chair of the Planning Commission and worked closely with staff to embody Environmental Sustainability wherever appropriate in that updated City planning document. It is, therefore, gratifying to see the attention given to Redmond's sustainability practices through devotion of staffing resources<sup>1</sup> and development of an Environmental Sustainability Study to advance understanding and future programs treating greenhouse gas emissions and sustainability in general.

Question – How will community members be encouraged to provide input and otherwise be engaged in this important environmental study? **TH 2020 Comment: The ESAP Stakeholder Group was the first step.** 

Before leaving the Clean & Green priority, I'd like to applaud the City's recognition of tree canopy as a vital element of Redmond's community character. On my own behalf and as a member of Sustainable Redmond, we have advocated tree canopy as an indicator metric since 2011 and repeatedly fought to retain or expand tree cover. TH 2020 Comment: The Tree Canopy initiative in the 2021-22 budget is another step forward.

Question – What is the prognosis for incentivizing plantings on private land?

#### Vibrant Economy/Connected Community/Responsible Government

These three budget priorities bridge a range of community engagement issues.

Within <u>Community Development</u> and <u>Development Services</u>, offers can be found that reference "regular, transparent and supportive two-way communication with the community" (supporting public interests) and references to an efficient and predictable development process (supporting development interests). These are two separate sets of customers whose goals can be in conflict when a hasty project approval procedure impacts the public's right to understand complex projects that could impact their daily lives.

Recommendation - Scheduling and quantifying "Number of community planning engagement opportunities" is a valid performance metric supportive of Community Development (Offer 178). TH 2020 Comment: Although there is a new emphasis on community engagement in the current budget, specific attention to early planning notification processes, like the Invitations for Public Comment, needs to be more proactive. (See next item.)

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Please do not let the broad range of potential environmental projects dilute the Program Manager's focus on greenhouse gas assessment and mitigation initiatives. Leave recycling, mobility and water quality to others, for example. **TH 2020**Comment: I strongly support the new Environmental Sustainability Program Administrator position for this reason.

Within <u>Connected Community</u>, the Community Engagement and Outreach Budget Offer contains a hopeful but ultimately unfunded position that would fill a long-needed gap in the City's communications structure,<sup>2</sup> to whit "The need for all City Departments to engage more effectively, dynamically and innovatively with the public is consistent with feedback received from the community and the City Council. This additional position will provide the community with neighborhood outreach and project-specific engagement for the Overlake, Downtown and Marymoor Village neighborhoods....This will allow the City to have one main point of contact both internally and externally for communication." Filling this position would assist the Planning Department (who does the minimum amount of required public notification) and supplement the Communication Division's historical emphasis on "softer" communications announcements that focus on matters of Citywide interest. (For example, much could be learned from the public comment process regarding the proposed Seritage development.) Inclusion of 3D visualization tools to encourage community feedback would augment the capabilities of this outreach function. TH 2020 Comment: Improvements have been noted in redmond.gov's treatment of neighborhood projects, the Property Viewer, and the brief "how to" video on the projects page. There is still a need to "push" project notifications to the community so neighbors are aware of an impending project and can make meaningful public comments in the limited time allowed. <sup>3</sup>

Comment – The existing and proposed performance measures below certainly point to a need to better understand and quantify the sense of the community. Over-reliance on subjective survey metrics throughout the budget to quantify performance can impact the credibility of the logic models and the budget in general.

New performance measure

Within <u>Responsible Government</u>, performance measures for the City Council (Offer 98) include "Percentage of Ombudsman issues that are formally acknowledged, closed and reported within established timeframes" which allegedly has a 100% success rate. I have had the occasion to deal with Council Ombuds-people and Councilmembers (largely through email) over the last year and have not been satisfied with Council responsiveness. The topics have addressed both procedural issues where process improvements are warranted and program-specific matters. My concerns were acknowledged but were not dealt with in a meaningful fashion. Transparency and accountability is important throughout City operations.<sup>4</sup>

Lest I be considered a solitary disgruntled citizen, let me cite performance measures regarding Community Engagement displayed in the table above that document the declining percentage of residents satisfied/very satisfied with their sense of connection to the community (down to 51% from 76% since 2015) or feeling informed regarding City affairs (down to 60% from 65%). The proposed new performance measure "Percentage of community members responding they feel that the City is listening and responding positively to their feedback" goes to the heart of this issue and should be a point of continued emphasis among City leaders. TH 2020 Comment: Can the actuals for 2020 be provided and compared to the relevant Target percentages?

Recommendation – Include citizen voices in any Council Procedures update that may be under consideration.

Finally, let's talk about the Overlake CIP

The Main Street improvement project for 152<sup>nd</sup> Avenue NE will create the signature element of Overlake Village. To support these significant investments, the public should better understand the timeline and programmatic interrelationships along that corridor from Bel-Red Road through the EastLink Light Rail Station at Route 520. The proposed Overlake Access Ramp and bike-ped bridge link over 520 to the light rail station are key mobility elements at the north end of 152<sup>nd</sup>. Less clear are the public safety improvements needed for pedestrians trying to access the station by crossing a busy and congested 24<sup>th</sup> Street.

Recommendation - I <u>strongly</u> recommend that the intersection upgrade on 24<sup>th</sup> include a footbridge over the west side of that intersection as a means to reduce ped-vehicle conflict or potential accidents and improve vehicle throughput.

North Overlake Village Parks/Stormwater Vaults represent significant infrastructure investments in Overlake, occasionally with participation from the private sector or agencies such as Sound Transit. North of 26<sup>th</sup> Street and west of 152<sup>nd</sup> Avenue will be one park and another green space will be built over the vault adjoining the light rail station. These two projects are listed as a total investment of \$32 million but that does not apparently include the cost of developing the two parks with necessary amenities.

<u>South Overlake Village Park/Stormwater Vault</u> are a similar set of complementary projects. The vault has been built and paved over by the City and a park feature is included in the Seritage development proposal. Investment in a "signature" park suitable for large scale community events allegedly totals over \$4 million.

Questions – Can the respective public and private contributions to the actual park features and amenities (less the stormwater vaults) be more clearly stated? (Seritage was responsible for the South Overlake/DeVinci Park as I understand it.) Please describe an integrated Overlake Parks planning effort in terms of timing, scope and opportunities for community engagement.

Dear Mayor Angela Birney, Chief Darrell Lowe and Redmond City Council Members:

I am astonished that at this time in history our very well funded police department has not made it a priority to implement body and dash cams for officers.

The Redmond police's website cites two primary reasons for this: lack of funding and cost of monitoring it to preserve privacy. I believe - and studies show - that the benefits far outweigh the cost, especially in relation to improving trust of Redmond citizens in our police and making officers accountable for their behavior. In terms of privacy, the ACLU does a good job of reviewing the risks and protocols that can be put in place to protect the public (<a href="https://www.aclu.org/sites/default/files/assets/police\_body-mounted\_cameras.pdf">https://www.aclu.org/sites/default/files/assets/police\_body-mounted\_cameras.pdf</a>).

A third justification is how it often assists in shining a light on and unraveling the sequence of events and facts in complex cases.

Additional benefits cited in research are, "[...] a surveillance tool to promote officer safety and efficiency and prevent crime." (https://www.ncjrs.gov/pdffiles1/nij/252035.pdf)

In addition there are significant unexpected benefits which were noted, such as increased community contact by police.

Given the need for transparency in policing, I do understand that policing is complex, and that officers may feel the burden of increased scrutiny with cameras. Police encounters can be subject to different interpretations. Ariel discusses many of the difficulties in drawing conclusions and designing studies that can effectively parse out the effect of body cam usage on public perception, on police use of force, and on complaints of police misconduct by the public.

Body cams and dash cams need to be accompanied by careful police hiring practices, as well as education and training to use them effectively. Policing is a hard enough job, and we need to lift up and support our officers, demonstrate how body and dash cameras can benefit them, while also increasing community trust and holding them responsible for their actions.

I believe the time has come for the City Council of Redmond, it's Mayor and Police Chief Darrell Lowe to seriously consider the implementation of body and dash cams for our police department and initiate a town hall type discussion that includes police officers, residents, our city leaders and council members.



# Dear Mayor Birney,

Police violence and systemic racial injustice is tied to America's original sin of racism and the abhorrent legacy of white supremacy. The time for bold reforms that ensure equal justice under the law extends to everyone is now.

As your constituent and a person of faith, I am asking you to do away with policies that lead to the unequal treatment of and violence against black, Indigenous, and people of color and adopt reforms drawn from evidence-based recommendations in the <u>Task Force on 21<sup>st</sup> Century Policing Report</u>, <u>Campaign Zero</u>, and more.

Specifically, we call on mayors, local officials, and local police precincts to:

- Ban chokeholds and neck restraints in all cases
- Require officers to de-escalate situations when possible, eliminating or reducing the need to use force
- Require officers to give a verbal warning before shooting
- Require officers to exhaust all other alternatives, including non-force and less-lethal force options prior to resorting to deadly force
- Ban shooting at moving vehicles
- Require officers to intervene and stop the use of excessive force by other officers
- Establish a use of force continuum that restricts the most severe types of force
- Require officers to report each time they use force or threaten to use force against civilians.

Every city should adopt these policies immediately. Furthermore, we call on you to begin the process now to reimagine public safety by reinvesting city budgets in programs that expand and enhance restorative justice programs, provide alternatives to incarceration, demilitarize the

Hello Chelsea,

Thank you for reaching out. I appreciate your thoughtful questions and have included answers below in italics.

I am sure you have heard about systemic racism. Mine is not the only voice on this topic, but i want to know how we can take action and make changes in Redmond, to help fight these injustices that have been normal for far too long. Racism is a big problem and the scope goes far beyond our seemingly peaceful suburb. But it is our responsibility to make change on a local level. I would like to know about what we have in place to address issues of inequality. Where can we help, raise awareness, raise funding, take action as a community?

• Yes, I have heard, and I am committed to continuing to listen and learn. The safety of our diverse Redmond community is our top priority. Our Police Department and City have and will continue to take the threat of bias and unequal treatment very seriously. In 2018 the Redmond Police Department formed a new committee to act as an advisory council on issues of equity, transparency, and community relations. This committee is named the Community Equity Action Team (CEAT), and you can learn more here on how to get involved.

At this week's City Council meeting, with the help of Councilmember Forsythe, the City Council and I issued a <u>proclamation</u> recognizing June 19, 2020, as Juneteenth in Redmond, and invited the City and community to join us in committing to take action to address systemic racism in our community. We will be talking much more about this in the weeks to come.

I want to also add that we as a city stand in solidarity with those in Redmond and around the country who are speaking out against racism, violence, and inequity. The City of Redmond and I affirmed our commitment towards a culturally inclusive community for all, through the 2017 Resolution no. 1465, and identified Cultural Inclusion as a top priority in the 2019 Community Strategic Plan. In addition, city staff and leadership were provided "Deconstructing Our Bias" training in 2019 to help our staff understand and recognize differing perspectives and implicit bias.

In areas like policing and education, system racism ruins lives. Too many racial minorities are targeted by law enforcement in this country. I am wanting to know what we can do in Redmond to protect and amplify Black people, Indigenous people and other people of color? Like many Redmond

residents, I am a supporter of the Black Lives Matter movement. Statically people who struggle in society are more likely to be racial minorities and experience hardships such as police brutality and imprisonment, struggle in schools, low income, struggle with drug abuse, domestic violence, homelessness, and access to medical care. That's not to say that all racial minorities are poor victims and criminals, but rather that our system fails them and they become targets for violence. In the history of the United states, it is obvious that racial minorities have been abused for far too long.

One big issue is police brutality and enslavement in prisons. What alternatives do we utilize instead of arrest and jail time? For youths, for people who are put in prison for drug use and sale, sex work, stealing to feed themselves...? These people don't need jail time. Going to prison means abuse, slave labor and inhumane conditions. What options do we have for rehabilitation that do not include the police? What options do we have to get people OUT of prisons?

• We have a <u>Human Services</u> division and a Mental Health Professional here at the City of Redmond that help identify necessary resources for those in need. We also have a Community Court program, and you can read more information on that program <u>here</u>.

Do we need to have police in schools? Are students arrested and disciplined by the police in their school? How are we holding police officers responsible?

- Below is some information from the Redmond Police Department on the School Resource Officer program you are referring to:
- Police are in the schools to help educate, build positive relationships, and enforce laws if
  necessary. Student discipline is always handled by the School District, and the responsibility of
  maintaining proper order and conduct in the school resides with the school administration.
  School Resource Officers (SROs) make arrests as a last resort, or in incidents of violence that
  require immediate response. SROs are trained in implicit bias, understanding the school to
  prison pipeline, youth diversion programs, conflict resolution, restorative justice, and other
  critical topics set out in House Bill 1216. Please reach out to rpd@redmond.gov if you have
  more questions about the SROs role.

How big is the policing budget, and can it be better utilized by shifting duties and funds to unarmed specialist workers? For example, in cases of sexual assault and rape, the response from law enforcement is too often ineffective and damaging. There are too many horror stories of police officers blaming the victim, and further traumatizing them with disbelief, invasive exams, and insensitivity, with little hope for justice. In fact, data shows many police officers are abusers themselves and are not held accountable their actions. Even officers who have been fired or have complaints of excessive force are still able to get jobs as police officers in different communities. How thoroughly is the city of Redmond investigating a police officer's past conduct?

Every police employee (officer or civilian) goes through a very thorough background check
where dozens (possibly hundreds) of people are contacted and interviewed about the subject.
Officers also go through a psychological exam and a polygraph test. Please reach out to
rpd@redmond.gov if you have more questions about background investigations.

In education, LWSD data shows that most students who are in special education are Black, Hispanic or low income. When a learning disability is added in, struggles with education can become impossible and these students experience large gaps in learning and achievement. They are being failed by the community. Are these students being pushed into a life of trouble and disadvantage? How can we help students who are struggling? What options are given to youth? Do they have opportunities for counseling, tutoring, and recreation? Can we put more effort into outreach for these students and their families?

• I would suggest reaching out to Lake Washington School District for these questions. The City of Redmond does have a recreation division, and we do cater to youth and young adults for many of those programs. You can learn more on our website about the recreation activities <a href="here">here</a>.

Of course the coronavirus has very damaging effects for vulnerable populations. How can we help those who are homeless, or unable to pay their rent and their bills? What about people who have lost their jobs, lost their childcare providers, don't have access to internet, can't work from home? Not everyone has the privilege to "stay home, stay healthy."

• You make great points. The City's <u>Human Services</u> division and mental health professional are helping to work with many of these vulnerable populations. We have some resources from the City, County, State and federal government listed on our website <u>here</u>.

When I read about the extremely high budgets for the downtown park, for moving art sculptures, for events like fireworks and derby days... I have to ask... can these funds be better utilized to help those who are suffering? I think parks and art and community events are important but programs to help the homeless, hungry, abused within our population are so much more important.

- Since COVID-19 hit, we are in the process of analyzing and readjusting our budget to accommodate the budget shortfalls related to the COVID-19 response and economic impacts.
- If you would like to get more involved in the next budget, Redmond uses a Budgeting by Priorities process, where the community helps us prioritize city spending. I encourage you to submit your thoughts on how we invest in our next biennial budget. As mentioned above, you

I have been so disheartened by the most recent conversation tonight with the police chief. It was stated that 4 FTE would be impacted by buying/supporting body cameras, that this is cost prohibitive to implementation. How much is a life worth? How much is justice worth? Are those FTEs so much more important than other services?

Alternatively, we know that the budget of RPD is both bloated and protected in ways that other COR services are not. I have 18-21 employees (seasonal and regular) that open community centers to those experiencing homelessness; I work in a department that helps myriad high-flying, victimized, and at-risk teens develop life skills; I work on teams that distribute meals to the elderly. We have been among the teams most egregiously impacted by slashed interim budgets, while RPD is incredibly protected, and indeed is hiring for well paying, full-time jobs (https://www.governmentjobs.com/careers/redmondwa). Looking at recent council payroll approvals, overtime is disproportionately allowed for public safety and approved, while so much else falls to the wayside. The new police FAQs are a hypocritical surfeit of platitudes that say nothing of the future of policing but instead stake a claim for their necessity in a city that is low-crime, and according to the chief, well supported with auxiliary agents like (a single) mental health professional. Why overtime then? Why support with their RPD uniforms the "unrest" in Seattle--they were visibly blockading peaceful protests in RPD uniforms in another locale. Why? Should Redmond dollars really go toward that?

After completing two (well, one and a half thanks to COVID-19) sessions of the Redmond Citizen Police Academy during that time, I am confident that the RPD is a fantastic part of our community. Rigorous hiring practices have built a team of skilled individuals who truly care about the people they are protecting. Any attempt to "defund" this institution would be harmful to the City at best, and criminally liable at worst. Redmond's population is forecast to continue spiking, so reducing RPD's effectiveness is a step in exactly the wrong direction. This whole "defund" movement feels like a misguided knee-jerk reaction to a few overpublicized, overhyped incidents occurring in communities far-removed from Redmond.

Hello Mayor, Council, RPD, and interns reading this:

Although I live in Redmond, I have been extremely frightened by the sights of the police brutality that have harmed my friends in Seattle and Portland. (And yes I do live here, my name's Anna Lantz, I live on 182nd Ave NE, Redmond, 98052, etc. etc...)

Because of this, I think it's more important than ever that we build upon the current Redmond police force's relative improvements in preventing police brutality, such as the methods listed on Redmond PD's site's FAQ section, in order to give a clear case to cities like Seattle and Portland that preventing police brutality does not lead to violent anarchy.

This means highlighting what we are already doing well that other jurisdictions are not, such as boosting the voice of our Community Equity Action Team, employing a full-time mental health officer who deploys alongside patrol officers, and working with the Homeless Outreach Program.

This means partial defunding of the Redmond police force coupled with public support of the defunding motion currently happening in Seattle, and reinvesting that money into known preventive measures for decreasing crime: community outreach, mental health resources, public education, and access to food and shelter. Obviously, this should be accompanied by looking into methods to decrease our community's reliance on cops for nonviolent, non-urgent issues, so the police can focus the money they do have on crimes that are truly best handled by police intervention (as

opposed to that of a counselor or social worker).

It would mean acknowledging that, while statements on when force can be used and encouraging police officers to file internal reports of excessive force on their coworkers are nice in theory, they are meaningless if not accompanied by transparent, independent methods of accountability. The fact that the vast majority of accusations of excessive force against the police department are dismissed is not a good thing - to many voters, it is a sign that investigations are not being taken seriously.

One of the best ways to increase public faith in the police department, in this case, is greater transparency: removing the requirement that IIT Leads must have work experience as a law enforcement officer (a conflict of interest form does not change the inherent conflict of only allowing police officers to lead investigations against other officers, and the difference of power between leads and community representatives hinders your check against these conflicts of interest), eliminate qualified immunity for cases of deadly force and bring disputed cases to a public court, and utilizing tools like body cams as evidence in disputed cases.

In summary: we should be using this political climate to prove that our own police force, by example, is capable of successfully minimizing police brutality, in order to encourage other locations to apply similar techniques.

Would you please read my quick history?

I was born in Iran as an Armenian. I was a Christian minority woman in a country where I felt equal to others. Until 1979 when the King left Iran.

Over night we lost our police, we lost our rights as minorities and I became a commodity as woman less valuable than a car.

When we lost our police, the crowds harmed and killed each other much like I am seeing here in the US. Moreover, the emergency services stopped responding because they didn't feel safe without the police.

Everyone became fearful, hopeless, crime rates & suicide rates went up. Our life turned from thriving into surviving. The criminals took over, after many deaths to family and friends, Iran erected a military system to protect it's citizens. So instead of having the police, we had military with AK-47 protecting us with their guns going off randomly and killing innocent people. Life in Iran was never the same. My family and I sold everything we had and were smuggled out of Iran to become refugees in Switzerland and later in the United States. We came here with the hope that we will be safe!

When you & the council members make the hard decision to listen to those who speak loudly about defunding the police, please also think about all of us immigrants who are now Citizens of US and living in Redmond. We feel safe here, please do not take our "SAFETY" away. I know many other families who feel the same as I do, but do not feel safe to voice their opinions.

My ask of you is to ask us, send a anonymous survey or set it up for vote. You will see, only the minority wants to defund the police, most of us are too scared to speak because we then become targets.

We can educate and help the police to be more diversity & justice minded. But defunding them means we will not have anyone to call if we need help.

Over the last 10 years the police have helped me:

- Catch a gang of thieves who were targeting houses in Redmond which brought strange cars and people to our neighborhood which I reported
- Human traffickers who came into contact with my neighbors children
- Saved me from an accident here in Redmond & reported it
- Rescued and serviced many or our neighbors and friends

These men and women is why many of us immigrant citizens feel safe in the US.

### Greetings,

I wanted to share an experience and my thoughts about our local police dept.

We have been residents of Redmond for 32 years, raised our family here, and have operated three businesses within Redmond city limits for the past 27 years. We employ approx. three dozen employees many of whom also live in Redmond. We have substantial investments here and Redmond is our permanent home.

Much of our larger business is disaster restoration/cleaning and the uncomfortable jobs that most contractors refuse to do.

Recently, we were tasked with removing and cleaning up another homeless encampment in the Redmond Town Center area. When these calls come in, results are expected in short order. Part of our logistics and safety plan is to have the occupant gone when our crews arrive. We are not counselors or enforcement.

On this most recent project, the occupant was still present after fair warning that we were scheduled to remove his collection of debris. For scale, the disposal weight was just under 4,000 lbs of contents and garbage/waste. The random contents were stolen goods from neighboring businesses and residential homes and the site was a haz-mat project. This is a serious problem and the 4<sup>th</sup> one (for us) within the last year in Redmond.

We had scheduled with RPD to assist. Two officers arrived on time and quickly removed the occupant from the site. Tho he was visibly agitated and obvious psychologicaly/drug abuse challenged, the officers proceeded to calmly explain the facts to him and enforce the law. Within 30 minutes, we were back on schedule to complete our job and return the area to a safe environment. This was textbook law enforcement.

I am sure this was just another call for the officers and nothing that they would take notice of. But to a citizen and business owner, it was exactly the day to day policing that keeps Redmond and it's citizens safe. Our crew noticed and I noticed. In fact, I cannot think of a police contact that I or any of my employees have had that was not professional and positive.

Officers Ott and Perlstein were the example of what policing looks like in Redmond. Chief Lowe should be proud that his police dept is setting the bar high.

With the current civil unrest in our society and the call to defund police depts, I find the lack of support for our police discouraging and short sighted.

To be honest, I find it a form of insanity that will lead to further chaos. Never in my life did I imagine city councils and city leadership would actually contemplate reducing law enforcement due to pressure from anarchists that offer only destruction and unfettered crime. Bowing down to those that threaten to disrupt and destroy our cities and livelihoods will only embolden them. Extortionists will always demand more. Always.

What has happened to Seattle and Portland (for example) should NEVER happen in Redmond. I implore all of you to make sound decisions based on what is in the best interest of Redmond and its citizens.

As you decide the course for our community, please keep in mind that the other 99% of citizens need and appreciate our police department and encourage a stronger department with more resources, not less.

We will continue to do our part to support those that support us.

My name is Sarah Herrera. I am a stay at home mother to two children who have gone to Redmond public schools. We have lived in Seattle since 2001 and downtown Redmond since 2004. My husband is a tech worker.

We don't need more studies or planning commissions or diversity and inclusion managers to explain why black and brown people feel unsafe in Redmond, why people are homeless, why the working poor can't afford to live in Redmond, or how to access meager, privately delivered social services.

Instead of creating another highly paid job for a college educated person, why not use that money to pay Redmond Inn to house people during the winter time? Instead of putting so much money into planning missions and funneling money to nonprofits so the rich can keep making decisions for everyone, put money directly into the pockets of the people who desperately need it? People need rent control, rent relief, real access to jobs and healthcare. Creating a manager of diversity and inclusion does nothing to further that cause.

Why didn't Redmond open City Hall or the library so that people could seek shelter this weekend? How can the city council justify funding multi-million dollar nonprofits like Hopelink with their closed \$13 million dollar office building while human beings are living in their cars? Relying on \$5 Safeway gift cards to get the unhoused off the streets for a few moments during an apocalyptic smoke crisis is not only contemptuous of the unhoused but of the Safeway workers who do not deserve to be volunteered as unpaid social workers

The problems have always been clear and the solutions have always been clear: people need food, jobs, and housing and when they can't get those things the government should give them money. Redmond's budget is enormous and it's astonishing how little of it goes

directly to the people. The federal government has neglected the people and are now watching them suffer and die. The appalling lack of humanity demonstrated by the supposedly liberal Redmond government towards the poor and unhoused, disproportionately black and brown people, during an environmental, economic, and health crisis is equally shameful.

#### Dear Mayor Birney

I was shocked that the Redmond police killed a woman after responding to her 911 call on Sunday night. For me, this highlights the need for a diversification in the skill sets for our pubic safety personnel who respond to emergency calls. The dialogue across the nation has been robust - particularly to ensure that all 911 calls are not responded to in the same manner. When all you have is a hammer than everything looks like a nail. Unfortunately, when it comes to issues of domestic violence and mental illness a hammer/gun response can lead to severe injury or death of a very vulnerable citizen.

A study was done on incoming prisoners to the Washington State penal system. Over 60% had preexisting traumatic brain injuries. Another 25% have chronic mental illness. For both of these populations, loud demands by police can be disorienting and cause panic. If a cop has a gun, the response to the person's panic can be severe injury to this vulnerable person. A great example is the 13 year old autistic boy in Salt Lake City who was shot 7 times and has lifetime injuries.

I would urge the City of Redmond to evaluate the police budget for 2021 to identify how to diversity our capacity for responding to 911 calls. This could include shifting some positions from cops to mental health professionals. That would provide more depth to our public safety response. Hiring mental health professionals who are skilled in dealing with mental illness, autism, head injury, domestic violence will benefit all of us. It will also benefit our police officers who will be under much less stress from situations for which they are untrained or under trained. From a financial perspective it is less costly as study after study has shown. And it avoids very sad and costly lawsuits

when cops over react to a stressful situation.

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Following the George Floyd killing I have been educating myself about policing and am taking a look at the city of Redmond where I live and vote. I am encouraged to see that in Redmond police officers receive annual de-escalation training, annual implicit bias training, and are expected to use a minimum level of force. Community outreach and transparency via the Community Equity Action Team seems like a great way to build understanding and trust between police officers and the community. Please continue supporting programs like these. To me, it seems worth considering vastly increased time for officers to train for difficult situations and to reflect and grow their skills as described in this video suggesting 20% training time.

I see that <u>dash cameras and body cameras</u> are not available in the Redmond police department. I can understand that the budget, privacy, and IT management of such a system will be challenging. However, this is essential for transparency and to protect both police officers and the community by being able to establish what really happened in a situation. Even if there isn't a deadly incident, this would also help officers to review what happened after action, learn, and improve their technique and handling of situations. It seems to me that dash cameras and body cameras are becoming an essential tool of modern professional policing. My question for the mayor and council is, what is needed in order to make this happen?

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Councilmember Forsyth and Council

May I complement you on the depth of questions regarding Overlake CIP in the first budget session last night. The conversation on what project funds are proposed in the current budget and what was proposed in the last CIP was a bit convoluted but necessary.

I have tracked Overlake Village development in some depth since

relocating to Redmond in 2004, including 8 years as the Overlake "specialist" on the Redmond Planning Commission and another 2 years as community member/co-chair of the PSRC's EastLink Corridor Task Force. It is that background that informs my comments during the prior budget cycle regarding Overlake CIP in my supplemental comment material previously provided and as extracted in the attachment below along with a previous statement from 2014. It was not addressed in my hearing testimony on Tuesday due to time limitations.

# Safe Access to Light Rail -

I strongly believe that safe bike-ped access to ST's Overlake Village Station needs continued attention and priority. While non-vehicular access to the Station from the north, east and west may be satisfactory given the 520 footbridge connections to 148<sup>th</sup> and overpass on 31<sup>st</sup>, the same cannot be said about access from the south.

I am most concerned about safe connections over the widened, high traffic 24<sup>th</sup> roadway, but also have some question about traffic flow off the new 520 eastbound bypass ramp as bike-ped riders approach the Station. As 151<sup>st</sup> and 152<sup>nd</sup> street designs reach refinement, and private developers make contributions to infrastructure investment, please keep carpedestrian conflict in mind and minimize barriers to Station access. A conversation with Bellevue on pedestrian corridors northbound from Bel-Red/20th to the Station would seem appropriate.

# Coordinated Park Planning -

As Overlake Village is built out, access to parks and rec facilities need to keep pace with the growing number of residents. I realize that Esterra Park and Seritage are supposed to provide some green spaces within their Master Plans. I also know that there will be an additional park across 152<sup>nd</sup> from the Esterra Park project as well as some sort of amenity/plaza adjoining the light rail station. If I understood staff comments correctly, developing a coordinated plan for development of these parks is presently part of the 2050 effort. In my view, that process is too protracted if we are to shape impending developments in Overlake most appropriately. A conversation with Bellevue would be prudent for collaborative planning of the broader Overlake district needs. (To my knowledge, the last joint meeting of the Redmond and Bellevue City Councils was September 30, 2014. Is it a time to schedule an update?)

Finally, let me note that the character of parks currently under consideration are largely flat green expanses with some amenities. That is why I was among those who hoped to preserve some of the trees in the former Group Health property (now Esterra Park) as an urban forest refuge. The opportunity for a tree refuge still exists, but it lies within the Bellevue jurisdiction. The former Unigard site (now Bellevue Technology Center) has maintained tree cover of the nature I recommend, but it is under up-zoning threat. Again, meeting the needs of the broader Overlake area might suggest some cross-jurisdiction collaboration to see if a joint district park is feasible.

Thank you for your focus on Overlake's long-range development. I have long felt that Overlake was not benefitting from geographic equity relative to Redmond's other Urban Center....the Downtown. Certainly the City has made significant investment in Overlake, but those investments are largely unseen in stormwater vaults. Overlake should not be underserved in the future.

Mr. and Mrs. Selby:

Thank you so much for your email and concerns about the Parks Department budget and staff reductions. This is a direct result of the pandemic.

As part of the Mayor's budget, there are proposed staffing reductions in all areas of Community Recreation and Events. We have had the doors closed on all of our facilities since March and have been unable to provide in person programming. Because of this, we are projecting a significant deficit in our Recreation Activity Fund and needed to propose staffing reductions in order to balance the budget.

The Recreation and Event staff have been providing virtual programs and events, providing customer service, launching a park ambassador program and provided much needed Meals on Wheels and Senior Nutrition Program. Most of these programs will continue, but we will not be able to provide in person programs until we receive guidance from the Governor's office that it is safe to do so.

The City has money set aside in an economic contingency that we will use to recover our Parks and Recreation Program once the City is able to open up under the Governor's guidelines.

Dear Redmond City Council and Mayor Birney,

I am again writing on behalf of my father Robert Selby, a 20 year member of the Redmond Senior Center.

When we learned of the proposed budget cuts which will eliminate a significant number of employees from the Parks Department (which largely is responsible for staffing and serving the Senior Center and other important programs such as those for Youth etc), we were very upset. Certainly with the Covid 19 crisis, all revenues and therefore budgets have been impacted and it is understandable that creative measures to find funding to support those positions are required.

It is our understanding that most communities have funds (emergency and otherwise) that have been set aside for use in unusual times such as what this year has wrought. Why is it that these emergency funds are not being used to support these critical Parks Department positions? It seems unreasonable that measures aren't being taken to utilize emergency funds in this time of fiscal crisis. If not now, then when?

It is most discouraging that the majority of the proposed cuts are to the Parks Department whose function it is to serve those most needy of Redmond's citizens (seniors and youths, among others). Other communities have found the resources to continue to fund necessary positions; it seems untenable that Redmond is unwilling to do the same.

Please revisit the scope of the proposed job cuts and reconsider utilizing other sources of funding (such as the emergency fund) to keep the majority of these positions filled. Once the Covid 19 crisis has passed, these positions will need to be refilled and those valuable and knowledgeable employees will have found other positions and we will be the losers.

Thank you for reaching out to our council. I am responding as council ombudsperson for the month of October and will report your comments at the next business meeting. Your comments will also be officially logged as a part of our budget deliberation process.

I truly appreciate your passion for our Old Firehouse Teen Center (OFHTC) and its programming. I am so glad that our city's programming made an impact on your life. We will take your comments into consideration when we discuss this item during our budget deliberations.

To give some context on this topic, the budget plans presented for this program are primarily related to restrictions due to COVID-19 and the fact that the OFHTC is currently closed. However, to be clear, this is temporary and **there are no plans to permanently close the center or its programming**. In order to keep our community healthy, our City has had the doors closed on all of our recreational facilities, including the OFHTC, since March due to the pandemic and have been unable to provide in person programming since then. As you probably know, RYPAC has continued to operate virtually and we have done some events virtually as well. We will keep doing so until King County Public Health's guidelines change based on levels of infection in our area. Unfortunately, King County safety guidelines have resulted in no large music events or other large gatherings at the OFHTC, no afterschool programs, or evening events since the pandemic began.

We are working on a recovery plan, and when we are able to provide in person programs again, we plan to reopen the OFHTC and bring staff back so that we can operate fully. Some of the proposed cuts you see are a result of the fact that these in person programs are not currently running and the staff is usually paid for out of revenue we make from those programs. That said, we will certainly keep your questions and comments in mind as we deliberate on our budget.

If you and other RYPAC members would like to meet to discuss this further, our Parks and Recreation Director Carrie Hite is available and I am also happy to join. Just email us back to let us know. I believe Director Hite is planning to reach out to RYPAC leaders to talk through the plan for the OFHTC and our other teen programming.

We will discuss this part of the budget this Thursday, October 29<sup>th</sup>, at a special meeting at 7pm. You can watch our meetings at <a href="www.Redmond.gov/rctvlive">www.Redmond.gov/rctvlive</a>, on City of Redmond's facebook page livestream, Comcast Channel 21, Frontier Channel 34, or listen at 510-335-7371. If you would like to share any other comments on our budget, we will be having a final Public Hearing to gather community feedback on Monday, November 2. 

Hi Ethan,

Thank you for reaching out to our council. I am responding as council ombudsperson for the month of October and will report your comments at the next business meeting. I am also copying in our email for tracking resident input on the Biennial Budget so your comments will be officially logged as a part of our budget deliberation process.

I truly appreciate your passion for our Old Firehouse Teen Center (OFHTC) and its staff as well as your years volunteering with our city. I am so glad that our city's programming made an impact on your life. We will take your comments into consideration when we discuss this item during our budget deliberations.

To give some context on this topic, we do not have plans to shut down the OFHTC permanently. In order to keep our community healthy, our City has had the doors closed on all of our recreational facilities including the OFHTC since March due to the pandemic and have been unable to provide in person programming since then. RYPAC has continued to operate virtually and we have done some events virtually as well, and we will keep doing so until King County Public Health's guidelines change based on levels of infection in our area. Unfortunately, King County safety guidelines have resulted in no large music events or other large gatherings at the OFHTC, no afterschool programs, or evening events since the pandemic began.

We are working on a recovery plan, and when we are able to provide in person programs again, we plan to reopen the OFHTC and bring staff back so that we can operate fully. Some of the proposed cuts you see are a result of the fact that these in person programs are not currently running and some staff is usually paid for out of revenue we make from those programs. That said, we will certainly keep your questions and comments in mind as we deliberate on our budget.

I have copied in our Parks and Recreation Director Carrie Hite if you have further questions on the status and plans for our teen programming and facilities.

If you would like to share any other comments on our budget, we will be having a final Public Hearing to gather community feedback on Monday, November 2. 

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#### Good Afternoon,

Thank you for the opportunity to provide written public comment regarding the Redmond Human Services Commission 2021-2022 funding recommendation. This public comment is also attached in case this is helpful.

My name is Enrica Hampton. I work at Kindering, a not-for-profit neurodevelopmental center that serves young children with diverse needs. One of the many services that we offer is Child Care and Preschool Consultation. This program is designed to support child care and preschool providers caring for children ages birth – six in a variety of ways including, but not limited to, the following:

- Classroom observations and teacher support.
- Individual child observations.
- Developmental screenings.
- Educational trainings.
- Family support and connection to appropriate resources/referral.
- Working with providers and families to develop strategies to help support the child in the child care.

On behalf of Kindering, I would like to sincerely thank the Redmond Human Services Commission for their 2021-2022 funding recommendation. It is because of the City's generous and ongoing support that Kindering has been able to provide this invaluable service to Redmond residents.

COVID-19 has had a significant impact on child care and preschool providers, families, and children. Child care and preschool providers are stressed and have concerns about finances, their own health and safety, job security, implementing new health and safety guidelines, and supporting the individual needs of the children in their care. Many families have concerns about finances, job security, and housing. Children are also stressed. Children are experiencing changes to routines, classrooms, and teachers. They may be absorbing the fears and worries of the adults around them. They may be receiving less physical contact from their caregivers because of all the health and safety guidelines that need to be followed as a result of COVID-19. Stressed children show their feelings through behavior such as crying, refusing to comply with directions, clinginess, and difficulty with separation. These types of behaviors might be more pronounced for children that demonstrate delays in their development.

Support for child care and preschool providers is needed now more than ever. Pre-COVID-19 we were seeing the following:

- Steady increases in young children presenting emotional and sensory regulation issues that significantly impact their social success in group settings.
- Parents struggling to find child care for their children that are demonstrating behavior challenges.
- Child care and preschool providers that are over-whelmed and doing the very best that they know how to do.

During the COVID-19 pandemic we are seeing increased dysregulation and stress. However, we also see the following when consultation services are utilized:

- Children that may have normally been expelled from the program are retained.
- Families able to access resources and services sooner.
- Providers report feeling more comfortable supporting children with developmental delays, disabilities, and/or behavior challenges in the child care and preschool setting.

Thank you again for your 2021-2022 funding recommendation. This support truly helps make a real difference in the lives of parents, families, child care and preschool providers, and most importantly our youngest Redmond residents.



I'm Kathy Fleming, the Executive Director of Attain Housing. Attain has been a strong member of the Eastside Community for 31 years. Attain provides housing and case management services for homeless families and rental assistance for Eastside families to prevent eviction.

First, I want to thank all of you for the work you are doing to support human services for Redmond residents. It's hard work, especially this year, and I know you're not getting a giant salary to do this. I know you will be making some tough budget decisions in your upcoming meetings and I want to encourage you to keep thinking about the people who really need your help during these difficult times.

Attain recognized over 6 years ago that the most cost effective and least traumatic way to address the homelessness crisis in our area was to prevent it in the first place. Why have a family suffer the stress and anguish of losing their home and be shuffled around in our System for years, when you can keep that from happening? For most families it is a short-lived crisis from which, with help, they can recover. During this pandemic it is even more crucial than ever.

Last year, with the help of the City of Redmond, Attain kept 241 families or 630 people, from losing their homes. 108 of them were Redmond Residents. All of them were low income and over 60% were extremely low-income. 44% were single mothers and 62% were people of color.

With the current economic crisis due to COVID, the need for rental assistance is greater than ever, not only in terms of financial, but to connect residents with other services. Helping people who for the first time are needing assistance and not knowing where to turn, Helping them find food resources, day care services, navigate the unemployment system. Providing them coaching and assistance in setting up a payment plan with their landlord; sometimes even negotiating directly with the landlord. These are the services that Attain and other agencies offer Redmond residents.

Attain Housing truly appreciates the support you have given us and the human services community over the years and we hope that you will consider fully funding the agencies recommended by your city staff.

### Gaylene

Thank you for recommending funding for Kindering's Parenting Plus in your 2021-2022 budget. I am Lois Ralph, and I have been the parent education coordinator at Kindering for 30 years.

Parenting Plus is a free ten-week program for parents of children ages 2 through 12, both typically developing and with special needs. Parents are more stressed now during COVID-19 as they try to navigate teaching their children, working at home or away, and handling all the other regular pressures of being a parent. They express a lot of frustration in trying to "do it all". The class offers them a place of refuge where they can share their challenges and successes with others. Each two-hour class is held virtually, using Zoom, since the pandemic. Presenting the classes remotely has allowed more parents to attend since they don't need to find child care or travel to the classroom

#### Topics include:

- pics include:

  Parenting during the pandemic

  Encouraging healthy self-esterm

  Effective communication

  Managing anger (both the parent's and the child's)

  Impact of media on children

  Managing behavior

Based on the needs and requests of the parents, the classes also cover other topics such as bedtime, sibling rivalry or shared parenting.

A young woman with a 6-year-old daughter and 3-year-old son was very concerned because her daughter had started nighttime bedwetting since COVID. The instructor worked with the mother about what might have precipitated the issues and, most importantly, techniques she could use to help her daughter. The mother also received support from the class.

During this unprecedented time, parents are looking for ideas that will help them nurture their child with calmness and a reassuring voice. Parenting Plus helps parents achieve this Thank you for assisting parents in getting the help they need to improve their parenting skills.

I would like to provide a comment for tomorrow's City Council meeting:

"I remember the first time I went to the Teen Center.

I had always wanted to go, and nearing the end of eighth grade, I rejoiced at even the concept of going there. When I first went there, it seemed too good to be true. The people there were so kind and warm, and despite how young I was, and I immediately felt like I belonged.

When I found out the Teen Center might be defunded, my heart broke. For so, so long, I had wished and wished to go to this place, and yet it might never open back up again.

I'm sure my friends feel the same way. For some, the Teen Center is the only place they can go after school, their safe haven from the rest of the world.

For me, as a queer teen, it felt like my world had been saved. A place to meet others like me, and to have the security of knowing I'm safe, in a place where I won't have to worry and fret and overanalyze every word I say in fear of outing myself, in fear of those uncomfortable and repulsed stares, in fear of that deafening silence of *oh*, *you're different*.

Other than a few select people, I'm always in disguise. I'm always under cover, always in fear of what will happen when my identity is found out. I have to delete certain things on my phone, always put my apps in a certain way so if my parents go through my things, they won't see, at least not at first. I have to make extra sure I'm not dressing too masculinely, so they won't start picking up on it. I can't be myself around my own family in fear of being yelled at or kicked out or *other*ed. This is a fear cisgender and heterosexual people will never have to face, and a fear I will be protected from if I have a place to go to, such as the Teen Center or RTAB meetings at the Library.

Where will I go, once they are gone? Back to the shadows, back to the fear, back to the indescribable loneliness. If I am discovered, what will become of me? Will I be cast out onto the streets, with nowhere to go, simply because of the way that I am? Where will my dear brothers and sisters and siblings go? What will become of them? What will become of us?

I've only been able to truly go to the teen center once in my life. I hope it won't be my last." Thank you,

My name is Zach Benzaoui. I was an active member of the Old Fire House Teen Center during my Middle and High School years through the Redmond Youth Partnership Advisory Committee. Thanks to RYPAC and the Firehouse Teen Center, I've had so many opportunities to engage with the Redmond Community and to see tremendous self-growth. RYPAC and the Teen Center have meant so much to me and so many other teens in Redmond. Without these communities, I would not be the person I am today, and I cherish all of the wonderful memories I've made with Teen Programs in the City.

Many of you have seen the value of the City's Teen Programs firsthand: you've attended RYPAC meetings, you've volunteered with teens at the Mayor's Day of Concern Food Drive, and RYPAC has come to the City Council to offer in-depth reports and updates about programs at the Fire House.

I implore you to reconsider the proposed budget allocations that have been made for the City's 2021-2022 fiscal years. I think I can speak for many teens when I say that the proposed budget cuts to recreation would be a colossal mistake. These cuts would remove important positions and staff from the Teen Center. Sam Smith, the current Teen Center Coordinator, is such an important leader at the Fire House, and it would be nearly impossible to imagine the Teen Center without her. She has consistently stood out as an advocate and a mentor for teens in the city, and **it would be a devastating loss for youth in our community if her position were to be cut from Teen Programs.** 

If Sam's position was to be cut from Teen Programs, events like Turkey Days, Summertime Radness, Teen Center Concerts, and so many other beloved teen events would be extremely difficult, if not nearly impossible, to host.

These events are so important to teens in the community and their value **cannot be overstated**. As someone who has spent nearly seven years volunteering with RYPAC and the Fire House, these are

the types of events that sparked my personal interest in volunteering and the interest for many other teens that currently participate in Teen Programs today. These are the events that every member of the Fire House looks forward to each year, and the teen center would not be the same without them. The proposed budget cuts would put a stop to many of the events that have had an immeasurable and profound impact on the Redmond teen community.

Our organization strives to improve the mobility of all people who live in and travel to Redmond. As the City prepares for light rail, now more than ever, it is time to invest in transportation solutions that work for everyone.

Transportation investments in sidewalks, trails, and transit passes perform triple duty in helping Redmond support their budget priorities. These investments connect the City's transportation system, improve safety on our streets and can reduce Green House Gas emissions, achieving the climate goals established in the Environmental Sustainability Action Plan.

GRTMA would like to acknowledge that this is a challenging budget cycle due to the financial impacts of Covid-19. Our comments on the budget are all centered on our work to make Redmond more accessible and inclusive. With that in mind, these budget items are worth the investment because they help the City fulfill multiple priority areas.

## Mobility of People and Goods Budget Offer ID #000343

- In this budget offer are several key elements that impact how people get around Redmond today and in the future. We support funding for the Transportation Master Plan Update, ensuring that the TMP outlines a path forward to achieving the goal of our members to make a more accessible and inclusive Redmond. Our organization looks forward to working with our members and ensuring their priorities are accounted for in the TMP update.
- Our organization would like to voice our support for the Go Redmond Residential program and would like to see the program funded in the next budget cycle. While our organization is contracted to do work within the Go Redmond program for employers, we are not impacted by this proposed budget cut. When people move into a new home, this is a great opportunity to change transportation habits. Empowering people with ORCA cards and information on how to navigate public transit and access bike routes, people are more likely to choose those modes of transit. Also, since Covid-19 has many employees put many out of work or furloughed, it is important to support people in making essential trips by transit, walking and biking. The residential portion of the Go

Redmond program will make an impact on the transportation choices of the people in Redmond and support our recovery.

• The \$25,000 cut to the professional services for walking and biking infrastructure is also of concern. In a time where the capital budget is tight, making smart investments in planning and design for bike/ ped infrastructure is strategic. Cutting these professional services puts the city at a major disadvantage for grants and opportunities to make small but necessary safety improvements in Redmond.

## Street & Traffic Safety Budget Offer ID #00222

• ADA curb ramps are vital infrastructure, and our organization has concerns about cuts to this part of the traffic safety budget. Curb ramps are essential for people with disabilities who use wheelchairs or walkers. They also serve many other people, including people biking, using scooters or other mobility devices and parents or caregivers with strollers. Curb ramps provide essential access to bus stops, local businesses and trails. When a curb ramp is missing a person may need to use the street and come in conflict with other vehicles, posing a very serious safety hazard.

## **Environmental Sustainability Budget Offer #000220**

- We strongly support the Climate Equity Vulnerability Report, it is essential to know who is being most impacted by Green House Gas Emissions and other environmental toxins from highway emissions and the impacts on peoples' lives and health.
- Transportation is a key piece of meeting the City's climate goals. Since transportation makes up 26% of GHG emissions in Redmond, it is an area where investments in transit, walking and biking can go a long way towards meeting our climate goals laid out in the Environmental Sustainability Action Plan.
- It is vital that the City of Redmond invests in Green Job training as the Redmond's economy shifts to sustainable energy sources as set in the Environmental Sustainability Action Plan.

## Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Budget Offer #000323

• Our organization strongly supports the hiring of a Diversity, Equity and Inclusion program manager for the City of Redmond. Please add language about how this position is rooted in anti-racism work and addressing the problems of systemic racism in City government. It is necessary to center Race in conversations around Diversity, Equity and Inclusion work.

Hi Councilmember Kritzer:

We are not discontinuing operations of the teen center or services. There will be a reduction of services.

As part of the Health and Sustainable budget priority, there are proposed staffing reductions in all areas of Community Recreation, including the Teen Center. We have had the doors closed on all of our facilities since March and have been unable to provide in person programming. Because of this, we are projecting a significant deficit in our Recreation Activity Fund and needed to propose staffing reductions in order to balance the budget.

RYPAC will still operate virtually, as well as some virtual events. We will continue to operate under the KCPH safety guidelines, which has resulted in no large music events, or other large gatherings at the OFHTC, no afterschool programs or evening events. The music studio has remained closed as well. The OFHTC has been closed.

We are working on a recovery plan, and when we are able to provide in person programs again, events, large gatherings, music, we have a plan to bring staff back so that we can operate fully.

This is a direct result of the pandemic.

We will take your comments into consideration when we discuss this item during our budget deliberations. In fact, we will be discussing this part of the budget tonight, Thursday, October 29th, at a special meeting at 7pm. To give some context on this topic, the budget plans presented for this program are primarily related to restrictions due to COVID-19 and the fact that the OFHTC is currently closed. However, to be clear, this is temporary and there are no plans to permanently close the center or its programming. In order to keep our community healthy, our City has had the doors closed on all of our recreational facilities, including the OFHTC, since March due to the pandemic and have been unable to provide in person programming since then. RYPAC has continued to operate virtually and we have done some events virtually as well. We will keep doing so until King County Public Health's guidelines change based on levels of infection in our area. Unfortunately, King County safety guidelines have resulted in no large music events or other large gatherings at the OFHTC, no afterschool programs, or evening events since the pandemic began.

We are working on a recovery plan, and when we are able to provide in person programs again, we plan to reopen the OFHTC and bring staff back so that we can operate fully. Some of the proposed cuts you see are a result of the fact that these in person programs are not currently running and the staff is usually paid for out of revenue we make from those programs. That said, I hear your points about not wanting to see budget cuts in this area and we will certainly keep your request in mind.

I have copied in our Parks and Recreation Director Carrie Hite if you have further questions on the status and plans for our teen programming and facilities.

It would be a massive mistake to withdraw even a fraction of the money that you have invested in their programs.

The life skills that teens get to learn about at school are then applied at the OFH where the stakes aren't as high as they are in a school, church/mosque or sports team setting. There MUST be places where young people are given space to try/fail/try/succeed without judgement while scaffolded by adults and peers that support them. This is what happens at the OFH every day of the week.

If you think that there is something more important than investing in the social-emotional well-being of even one youth – I double dog dare you to double down and find it. Because nothing else is that important and in your core, each member of the City Counsel, the Mayor's office and the Redmond Police Department knows it.

Keep the OFH funding to keep your deep-core integrity. Make sure your votes mirror your values of giving actual support to Redmond youth in every way that they express themselves.

My name is Lex Rain Spahr and I organized and played at the first show at the OFH back in 1992 when the building was rented out to the YMCA. I was employed at the OFH for multiple-year stretches and I worked there unpaid for just as long from the time I was 17 through when I was 28. I have attended so many Redmond City Council meetings advocating for the OFH – but the last I went to was in 2002. I did not think that I would have to be writing this letter 18 years later.

I don't know more about the OFH than other people – but having been one of the original group of teens who worked to make the program come to life, I have been able to see and hear about waves and waves of youth whose lives have been scaffolded by the support that the OFH provides.

To consider shifting funding away from this program would be misguided. I deeply and profoundly ask you to please think again. You have something special that no other city has. Why discard a gem?

OFH teens need your support and funding.

# Good evening,

Please submit the following as an item from the audience from me, Levi Casto.

"My name is Levi A. Casto. I am 21 years old and a current student at the University of Washington. I write this note today as a lifelong resident of Redmond, former frequent visitor of the teen center, and former teen center employee, and 2017 recipient of the Derby Do-Gooder Award, given to me by the city in recognition of outstanding public service and volunteerism in the city. I write to advocate in opposition of the proposed defunding of the Old Firehouse Teen Center in Redmond. I must, in the strongest words possible, speak to the necessity of full funding for the Old Firehouse Teen Center, and outline how this proposed defunding is an egregious departure from the values of the City of Redmond.

During my time at the teen center, from 2012 to 2018, I was offered the opportunities that made me who I am today. The Firehouse offered me access to counselling that I otherwise could not afford, to career development opportunities I could not find elsewhere, to leadership and volunteer experiences that are unmatched elsewhere on the Eastside, to artistic spaces and supplies I could not access anywhere else, and to a community of friends and mentors I couldn't find at school or at home. Had it not been for the Firehouse, I would not have had access to any of these opportunities, all of which are put at risk and may be lost if the proposed budget cut is enacted.

The teen center is a vital "third space" for Redmond's youth. Outside of the Teen Center, Redmond has virtually no free, publicly accessible, after-school programming for its teenagers. The Firehouse offers a place, programming, and a community for every teen in the city and beyond, and the fact that cutting funding for such a staple of our community is on the table is a disgrace.

Redmond identifies its four core values as Commitment to Service, Integrity, Accountability, and Welcoming. At the time I am writing this note, 1,275 people have signed a petition advocating against this budget cut, because they understand how essential the teen center and its programming is, especially amidst a pandemic wherein many teens are struggling to develop community and access important resources. To cut funding for vital programs now, of all times, against the will of the city's residents, would be to betray Redmond's core values of service, integrity, accountability, and welcoming.

I implore councilmembers to consider the impact the teen center has on local youth, the resources and opportunities they will block access to if they move forward with defunding it, and the message that the city wants to send to its teenagers."

Hi there, please include the below testimony for the written public record regarding the elimination of budget for the Old Firehouse Teen Center:

---

My name is Zahra. I am among the thousands of people impacted by the safety and love of the Old Firehouse (OFH) as a teen between 2004-2008. I moved to Washington in 9th grade, which was a tough adjustment. After a short while of searching for my place, I found it - the OFH. The staff, teens, and musicians wrapped me up in a safe and nurturing environment where my life changed for the better. I started a band with friends and recorded an EP in the studio thanks to Jeff McNulty and others. I discussed current events and issues impacting teens with Rana Shmait and Nancy Chang. Ken Wong was always, always there for an encouraging word and helpful advice. When I was there, teens could access therapy and talk to a trusted adult in a safe place. Sam Smith helped folks learn baking, my peers interned with sound and lighting engineers. We learned to speak up for ourselves and discover our boundaries. I can't imagine a Redmond without the teen center. Kirkland lost KTUB this year; the Eastside cannot be devoid of a safe space for teens to be. Considering the rising abuse of opiates, ready access to other drugs and alcohol, and a shrinking number of free, safe places for youths, I can't believe that the City is considering defunding this absolute treasure. When I think back to my younger self and consider what I would have been doing if the OFH was not there, I remember friends who lurked in parks and abused substances, or who suffered depression and felt like outcasts and I hurt to think where they would have been. Please -Redmond is already losing its soul with the huge numbers of new buildings and development. There has to be a free, safe, nurturing, and interesting place for kids to be. So many of my friends found their calling at OFH, so many lives were saved by the presence of the center and those who worked to make it amazing. A few years ago I attended the 25th anniversary of the OFH and I was so proud to see all my former peers thriving in adulthood - attributable in part to the OFH's sturdy scaffolding. I myself am a well-adjusted professional thanks to the OFH.

Hearing the news that the City may eliminate the budget for the OFH sends the clear and direct message that teens need to figure it out on their own; they have no home in the City; they have nowhere to congregate and learn; they are welcome to seek other places to feel like they have a home, which is so likely to be a worse option. It is the duty of the City of Redmond to look out for all of its citizens, and to remove this would be at best neglectful.

Thank you, and I desperately hope you reconsider. We can do better.

Sincerely, a former at-risk teen who found hope and inspiration through a City funded teen program.

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## **Redmond City Council**

I am extremely disappointed in the current City council's plan to cut the staff at the OFH in half! They currently only have 2 employees (all the supplemental or part time employees were let go as soon as Covid hit - only the 2 full time employees have been left to carry on virtually this whole time). This is a levy funded center! That means the residents have already spoken and stated that the OFH and senior center are important enough to guarantee funds. You cannot then just shuffle the funding to suit your current designs! That is going against your constituents directly. And it is a good way to send the message that you don't care what your people want. As you know, when voters feel that they are not being listened to, they immediately vote out everyone currently in office, usually without researching to see who voted for what.

I understand that the City has lost a lot of revenue and needs to make adjustments and cuts. I question how cutting 1 full time job (or even 10) will make enough of a change to realize any benefit to the budget. I also question why all of the jobs are being cut from recreation and none from parks or facilities departments. With so many parks and buildings staying closed, I wonder why all of the cuts are only in our community and recreation areas. What about some of the newer departments created in the last 1-2 years? Would that be better areas to cut? Marketing?

I question why the OFH teen programs are being viewed as revenue based programs. They should be viewed as teen services and that is why the residents guaranteed their funding through levy funds. Because the residents think it is important to provide these services to our teens. While occasionally, once open, their events may bring in some funds, that is not and Should Not be the focus of the OFH program director as the City is currently instructing. Their focus is on developing inclusive programs with teen involvement and buy-in. Programs that

engage teens and give a voice to teens and develop leadership opportunities for teens. This is how you create leaders. And dumping all our funding into a general community center that has some teen programs is not the same thing. That is not a cost saving idea, that is a cop-out and an illusion of programs that will not be what our teens need. The OFH has been within their budget on a regular basis and is currently well under budget! A general community center absorbing the teen center is not what Redmond needs, and is not what Redmond wants. That is why Redmond voted in the levy funds specifically for the teen and senior centers.

The OFH is an important tool for our City going forward. It's staff and programs promote diversity and inclusion as well as being a safe place for our youth. This is one of Redmond's most diverse and equitable programs to date. Providing empowerment to some of our most vulnerable and under represented populations. While the OFH has been closed during the pandemic their programs have continued virtually. They even found ways for teens to volunteer in the community during this shutdown (with no contact). I encourage all of you to follow them on Instagram or Facebook to see what they are doing for your youth! With just the 2 full time employees the OFH has currently, they have built virtual programs over the 6 months since the pandemic and have over 1250 followers on Instagram alone! In addition, they are running multiple internships for teens; mentoring their ideas and creativity to help this community. This is what creative, passionate, leaders can do when they care. What other department can say that? Can Parks say that? Can building maintenance? Can the City Hall? Or even the city marketing department? Are any of these departments creating virtual programs or have over 1200 followers? And are they losing staff? 50% of their staff?! So let's try supporting OFH staff and your youth going forward. And do what is right and what we voted for! Keep the OFH open (even virtually) and staffed and paid for by levy funds.

"To help combat the impact the COVID-19 pandemic has had on the City of Strongsville's tax revenues, <u>all full-time city employees not covered under a collective bargaining agreement</u> – as well as the mayor, department heads, service department workers and building inspectors -- will be placed on a <u>32-hour work week starting</u> \_\_\_\_, <u>resulting in an eight-hour weekly furlough (a 20 percent pay reduction)</u>.

The furlough will not affect police, firefighters or dispatchers. All three operations will remain ready to respond.

Service Department personnel will be scheduled so that workers are available to respond to any potential emergencies.

The furloughs will stay in effect until at least \_\_\_\_. when the city's finances will be evaluated and a decision made about returning to normal hours. We apologize for any inconvenience."

Hi Mr. Seliber,

Thank you for reaching out to our council. I am responding as council ombudsperson for the month of October and will report your comments at the next council business meeting. Your comments will also be officially logged as a part of our budget deliberation process.

I truly appreciate your passion for our Old Firehouse Teen Center (OFHTC) and I hear your voice along with the many others that wrote to us about this topic. I'm glad the OFHTC has made a difference in your life and in the lives of your sons – thank you for sharing your story with us.

To give some context on this topic, the budget plans presented for this program are primarily related to restrictions due to COVID-19 and the fact that the OFHTC is currently closed. However, to be clear, this is temporary and there are no plans to permanently close the center or its programming. In order to keep our community healthy, our City has had the doors closed on all of our recreational facilities, including the OFHTC, since March due to the pandemic and have been unable to provide in person programming since then. RYPAC has continued to operate virtually and we have done some events virtually as well. We will keep doing so until King County Public Health's guidelines change based on levels of infection in our area. Unfortunately, King County safety guidelines have resulted in no large music events or other large gatherings at the OFHTC, no afterschool programs, or evening events since the pandemic began.

We are working on a recovery plan, and when we are able to safely provide in person programs again, we plan to reopen the OFHTC and bring staff back so that we can operate fully. Some of the proposed cuts you see are a result of the fact that these in person programs are not currently running and the staff is usually paid for out of revenue we make from those programs. That said, we heard a lot of passionate concern from community members like yourself about the proposed budget cuts and at our first budget discussion around this topic multiple councilmembers, including myself, voiced interest in looking into options that might avoid some of the proposed cuts in our Parks and Recreation staff.

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I am commenting on the proposed 2021-22 budget. I recognize the difficulty of developing a budget in these difficult and uncertain times. The projected growth in Redmond's population and housing is another factor that needs to be carefully considered while trying to maintain a city we like to live in. The amount of detail is helpful in understanding how the budget was developed.

I think the proposed budget showing a reduction of about 2.5% of employees for all funds is reasonable. It is unfortunate, but understandable, that the largest reduction is from the Parks and Recreation areas. I believe the small reduction in fire and police is reasonable. Hopefully, they can continue to provide the same high level of service over the next 2 years as Redmond grows. It appears there is still a strong commitment to maintaining the environment while planning for the future development of Redmond. The projected deficit of \$24.6 MIL is unfortunate but hopefully with an improved economy, it will be reduced.

Please accept these written comments in lieu of oral testimony this evening.

I would like to support statements provided by the Greater Redmond Transportation Management Association as they seek to add efficiency to our transportation systems and reduce greenhouse gas emissions in the process. This endorsement is consistent with my previous comments on greenhouse gas/carbon reduction measures and the value of a TDM assistant on Redmond staff.

Further, I support retention of the \$50,000 line item for the Green Redmond Partnership as a modest effort consistent with the City tree canopy and environmental sustainability objectives. This is an endorsement of the comments from Mr. Gary Smith of October 20, 2020 as reflected in the Public Comment Matrix.

On the subject of the Public Comment Matrix, under the column headed "Status"....is there an expectation that comments from the community will be addressed in a substantive manner or simply have their receipt acknowledged by staff?

I applaud the new Community Satisfaction Rating contained in the Strategic and Responsive priority. Per my earlier comments of October, 2018 as extracted in my public comments of October 2020 under:

In pursuit of our mission, the Eastside Change Coalition has compiled a list of our current demands for the Redmond Police Department, City Council, Mayor's Office, and Lake Washington school district. As residents of the eastside, these demands target what we see as a handful of easily solvable issues that disproportionately affect marginalized communities. We have conducted research to inform these demands; they are not random or without evidence of being significant. The year is 2020,

and we are past the point of asking politely for change. The aforementioned institutions must truly serve all by meeting the demands of our organization and all who we represent.

### Demand 1

### We demand the establishment of a comprehensive Police Mental Health Collaboration (PMHC) Program to respond to the mental health needs of Redmond

Mental health is a problem in the Redmond community. More specifically, mental health is a problem with insufficient resources allocated to resolve it.

Looking at data collected on 991 calls directed to Kirkland Police Department\* per week from 2018-2019, we can see that calls involving mental health assistance are the 5th largest category. Despite this, our police force is not equipped or trained to adequately handle mental health emergencies. This inadequacy serves to reinforce the issue of increased incarceration and conviction of individuals dealing with mental health issues. If the police department is truly committed to embracing their mission to actively reduce crime, address traffic safety issues and maintain the highest level of safety and security for residents, employees, businesses and visitors in Redmond, they should dedicate themselves to best preparing themselves to respond correctly to *every* situation.

Currently, the Redmond Police Department has a single mental health professional, Susie Crawl, who is deployed occasionally at the discretion of the dispatcher. She has training in the skills of mental health support, de-escalation, and problem resolution. However, one mental health professional is not enough for the scale of the demand for professional trained mental-health conflict resolution experts in Redmond.

We demand that the Redmond Police department establish and maintain a comprehensive police Mental Health Collaboration Program to respond to the mental health needs of Redmond. A program like this must adhere to the 10 essential elements of a PMHC program as laid out clearly by both the Bureau of Justice Assistance and Council of State Government Justice Center toolkits for developing a PMHC program. These essential elements are as follows

- Collaborative Planning and Implementation
- Program Design

- Specialized Training
- Call-Taker and Dispatcher Protocols
- Stabilization, Observation, and Disposition
- Transportation and Custodial Transfer
- Information Exchange and Confidentiality

The first step of meeting our demand is to establish a dedicated committee whose primary responsibility is to design, implement, and maintain a successful PMHC program. This committee would work with the <a href="Technical Assistance">Technical Assistance</a> (TA) program of CSG Justice Center, research and clearly understand the exact needs of Redmond, receive regular input from community members, especially marginalized community members, and present drafts of program outlines to the Police Department Chief to be reviewed and approved. While the initial step of designing a PMHC program is extremely critical with a series of long-term impacts, only a very small budget is required for such a committee to be successful. Anticipated costs may include trips to example agencies, hosting community engagement sessions, outreach, and recruitment for professional help.

We have given a handful of resources to jumpstart this process, though the burden lies with the police department to construct their own plan to meet this demand. This demand is very obtainable, and will have huge impacts for the community of Redmond. We expect this demand to be met before the end of December, 31st, 2021.

\*We have not been able to obtain data on RPD dispatcher calls statistics. KPD is an adjacent police department serving similar communities, and therefore can serve as a rough basis for RPD

### Demand 2

### We demand the establishment, fulfillment, and operation of a Redmond DEI Program Manager position

Redmond is not free from the systemic racism and bigotry that plagues the rest of the United States. Though the Redmond city council has set up programs in the past to fight against this racism and bigotry, there has been very little done to ascertain the actual extent of the problem. Most of the information on this subject requires digging deep into unofficial records, speaking to people working in public service, and anecdotal evidence. For example, there is clearly a disparity in housing. Due to the tiny Black population in Redmond, the average household income for Black residents is higher than the average for white residents, but the percent of Black residents without the ability to acquire an affordable home is higher than that of any other group. 13% of Black residents make less than \$20,000 a year, as opposed to 7.5% of the total population. Meanwhile, only 3% of housing costs per year are less than the \$6,000 that would be considered affordable for this income level in King County. This information, however, is not collected in one place. It's spread across multiple surveys on both government and non-government websites. Drug and homelessness numbers are even harder to find. Though talking to the city homelessness coordinator reveals that there are about 70 homeless individuals in Redmond, this number and its racial breakdown cannot be found on any official databases.

Cultural competency training in Redmond City employees is also relatively low. The target for 2020 has only 325 of the 711.92 full-time equivalent employees of the City of Redmond receiving training for

equity and cultural competency, and the current plan only extends that number to 411 by 2022. With disparities such as the housing issue noted above, the city would benefit from higher training numbers. Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion programs, often shortened to DEI, are programs that intend to cultural equality and human rights. Redmond's DEI efforts are carried out by a work group of representatives from different city departments, such as police, planning, and communications. As Mayor Birney recommended in her budget proposal, this system would benefit from a single DEI program manager, allowing these representatives to act more like liaisons. This position would create a more coordinated approach to Redmond DEI than has been available before.

Therefore, the Eastside Change Coalition makes the following three demands from the City of Redmond:

In drafting these demands, we spoke with Mariko Lockhart, the director of the Seattle Office of Civil Rights. We feel that it will be necessary in expanding the powers and efforts of this diversity, equity, and inclusion officer for the city of Redmond to consult and study DEI offices of other cities. Seattle's office focuses mainly on civil rights enforcement, but its many programs related to DEI are an invaluable resource.

### Demand 3

### We demand the expansion of the Redmond Police Department's Community Equity Action Team

The ideas and experiences of members from the Redmond community are often being overlooked. This is the main reason why the Redmond Police Department (RPD) created the Community Equity Action Team (CEAT) in 2018.

During a CEAT meeting on Wednesday, 28 October 2020, it is clear that they are on the correct path to ensure that all members of the community have their voices heard. But two of the main demographics that were missing from the conversation were the youth and those of whom that have disabilities. The

members of CEAT are aware of this and are working to recruit members of these demographics. They are currently working with Chanin Kelly-Rae to be more inclusive and equitable. However, CEAT needs to build a strategy that allows them to connect with more individuals to ensure that everyone from the community of Redmond has representation.

We demand that the Community Equity Action Team continues on the path that they are currently on. For recruitment, they should create smaller teams with individuals from certain demographics who can reach out to members of their smaller communities within Redmond to either have more entities of different demographics show up to team meetings to share their ideas and experiences with the group, or to have someone speak on their behalf.

If CEAT follows the advice of this demand, not only do we believe that the team will be more inclusive, we believe that the team will also be more equitable and will be able to foster the engagement of individuals from the Redmond community to build a better partnership between the Redmond Police Department and the people that they serve.

### **Demand 4**

### We demand that the Lake Washington School District abolish the SRO program, and reinvest the SRO budget into Community Wellness programs.

Police brutality is rampant across the nation. Here in Washington State, we have witnessed the deaths of Charleena Lyles, Shaun Fuhr, Manuel Ellis, and so many others all at the hands of cops. Just a month ago, 3 Redmond police officers shot and killed Andrea T. Churna, an innocent 39-year-old woman, in her own home. The countless murders of Black and brown people have made it incredibly clear that cops do not provide safety for our communities.

Black and brown students are disproportionately harmed and criminalized by police forces at schools. They represent 31% of school-related arrests in the United States and are 3 times more likely to be expelled than white students. Student Resource Officers (SROs) increase youth contact with the criminal punishment system by perpetuating the school-to-prison pipeline. According to the ACLU, this is a national trend where students are funneled from their public schools into juvenile and criminal justice systems. Students who are punished for discretionary crimes are nearly 3 times more likely to end up in these systems the following year. Additionally, many of these children have learning disabilities and histories of trauma, abuse, and neglect. Instead of being provided access to mental health, counseling, social services, and other resources needed to heal, they are isolated and detained (ACLU).

Currently, the Lake Washington School District spends \$184,000 per year on SRO enforcement in schools (LWSD Budget Report). This is a huge sum of money that would be much better invested into valuable mental health services and resources that actually provide safety for the community. Police are only reactionary forces, they do not stop harm or violence but rather respond to it, often with brutality rather than de-escalation. Instead, the district can take steps to prevent crime and cultivate real safety by implementing holistic community wellness programs and hiring professional mental health counselors that are trauma-informed and trained in de-escalation.

As members of the Eastside Change Coalition, we demand that the Lake Washington School District permanently cuts all ties to police departments and invests in the mental health and wellbeing of their students and communities.

We demand that the school district do the following:

- 1.
- 2. Permanently abolish the
- 3. SRO program. This includes the complete removal of all Student Resource Officers, Special Security Officers, and any other forms of police from every school within the district.

- 6. End all relationships to
- 7. the Redmond, Kirkland, and Sammamish police departments as well as the King County Sheriff department. This includes their exclusion from all LWSD committees and an end to all recurring donations given to police foundations

- 11. into student and community wellness by investing in mental and physical health services, hiring more counselors, nurses, and healers, and implementing transformative justice programs and holistic de-escalation spaces

- 15. Committee led by Black, Indigenous, People of Color counselors, community members, and teachers to lead the implementation of community wellness initiatives, review programs already put in place, and decide on further solutions for providing student support.

SRO presence in our schools jeopardizes the safety, well-being, and futures of our students and communities especially our BIPOC members by adding to the racial traumas already impacting them and their families. While we acknowledge that members of the Lake Washington School District have had some positive interactions with our SROs, this does not excuse the harm, brutality, and criminalization of Black and brown people that continues to occur by police in our community.

### Demand 5

### We demand the allocation of funds to hire two more homeless program coordinators for the City of Redmond.

A task force of one does not have the ability to strategize the response to homelessness for the entirety of Redmond. With a heavy reliance on community partners and mental health agencies, another homeless program coordinator would take this large load off the back of one person and could allow for more expansion and development of homeless programs rather than doing the bare minimum.

In an interview with Tisza Rutherford, we learned valuable information about her position and what it entails. Currently working with 128 individuals in total, Tisza has her hands full running around Redmond and other neighboring cities developing relationships with new faces while keeping contact flowing with familiar ones. We believe she is an important resource that is being spread far too thin which is not a sustainable way for her to continue being effective at her job.

As a task force of one within the planning department, her job includes strategizing the response to homelessness, patrolling areas of Redmond, and connecting the homeless population with resources.

The police funnel all homeless cases to her, and from that point on, she is the main resource they have. How can only one person handle checking in with over 100 people all living in different areas or camps in neighboring cities? Her partnership with the police is a step in the right direction but without them having the ability to interact with homeless individuals they are just messengers and leave her with all the follow-up.

We believe the homeless population residing in the city of Redmond would benefit from another homeless coordinator that can balance out Tisza Rutherford's caseload. Having another point person would allow more strategizing of the larger homelessness issue rather than working only the day-to-day operations. We were told that there are allocated funds to hire another coordinator but that was not apparent on the city's budget report.

In your upcoming budget meetings, we request you strongly consider hiring another homeless coordinator or someone with similar responsibilities to balance the heavy caseload Tisza Rutherford currently has.

### Demand 6

## We demand the education and thorough training of local law enforcement to become a resource for the homeless population in the City of Redmond.

By requiring all current and future law enforcement to participate in de-escalation and mental health training they will be better equipped for unforeseen interactions while on duty. The ultimate goal of having law enforcement agencies is to maintain order and reduce violence and crime. Redirecting a portion of the budget towards paying for more extensive training would teach skills that could be useful on a day to day basis, and reduce the likelihood of unintentional harm to community members.

A better use of taxpayer money is shifting funding to social services such as mental health, addiction, and homelessness. Police spending should reflect what communities pay in exchange for public safety, to keep all communities safe. Giving them the skills to interact more personally within the community will allow there to be more trust and a resource that people feel safe approaching if necessary. Putting police officers closer to the homeless population would result in more direct relationships and ultimately having them feel more comfortable around law enforcement. Today, many law enforcement agencies are implementing direct outreach to homeless individuals and encouraging their officers to show compassion for homeless persons.

The homeless coordinator working for the city, Tisza Rutherford, is currently the point person for the homeless population in Redmond and needs more support. Providing your officers with this training could also make them a resource for her. When officers come into contact with a homeless individual, they funnel the case to her, and from that point on, she is the main resource they have. The city's partnership with the police is a step in the right direction but without them having the ability to interact with homeless individuals they are just messengers. At least presenting the option for officers to complete mental health and homeless training could greatly increase their positive contact with the homeless population.

The Cambridge Police Department in Massachusetts created Homeless Outreach Officers who focus on the contact everyday officers had with homeless individuals. Their focus is on specifically the homeless population in Cambridge and reducing the amount of nuisance behavior calls while improving the lives of everyone in the community. They understand that police are normally the first to interact with them and that creating a solid basis of communication and understanding would benefit both people in the future. They believe that officers who take the time to "know the individual are able to establish a rapport [often lead] to referral for much needed health care services and [a] mutual understanding of desired outcomes" (Source 6).

By offering de-escalation or homeless training, you will be providing your officers with the skills to always be prepared for any situation that could arise.

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



### The Eastside Change Coalition Demands to the Institutions of Redmond

As youth activists, we will unite together to reimagine, recreate, and restructure the current systems of power that oppress and abuse Black and brown bodies. We will create a network of resources to allow for the facilitation of robust education on institutional systems of oppression, for all who are looking to learn.

We are the next generation and together we will change the world.

In pursuit of our mission, the Eastside Change Coalition has compiled a list of our current demands for the Redmond Police Department, City Council, Mayor's Office, and Lake Washington school district. As residents of the eastside, these demands target what we see as a handful of easily solvable issues that disproportionately affect marginalized communities. We have conducted research to inform these demands; they are not random or without evidence of being significant. The year is 2020, and we are past the point of asking politely for change. The aforementioned institutions must truly serve all by meeting the demands of our organization and all who we represent.

### Demand 1

## We demand the establishment of a comprehensive Police Mental Health Collaboration (PMHC) Program to respond to the mental health needs of Redmond

Mental health is a problem in the Redmond community. More specifically, mental health is a problem with insufficient resources allocated to resolve it.

Looking at data collected on 991 calls directed to Kirkland Police Department\* per week from 2018-2019, we can see that calls involving mental health assistance are the 5th largest category. Despite this, our police force is not equipped or trained to adequately handle mental health emergencies. This inadequacy serves to reinforce the issue of increased incarceration and conviction of individuals dealing with mental health issues. If the police department is truly committed to embracing their mission to actively reduce crime, address traffic safety issues and maintain the highest level of safety and security for residents, employees, businesses and visitors in Redmond, they should dedicate themselves to best preparing themselves to respond correctly to *every* situation.

Currently, the Redmond Police Department has a single mental health professional, Susie Crawl, who is deployed occasionally at the discretion of the dispatcher. She has training in the skills of mental health support, de-escalation, and problem resolution. However, one mental health professional is not enough for the scale of the demand for professional trained mental-health conflict resolution experts in Redmond.

We demand that the Redmond Police department establish and maintain a comprehensive police Mental Health Collaboration Program to respond to the mental health needs of Redmond. A program like this must adhere to the 10 essential elements of a PMHC program as laid out clearly by both the Bureau of Justice Assistance and Council of State Government Justice Center toolkits for developing a PMHC program. These essential elements are as follows

- Collaborative Planning and Implementation
- Program Design
- Specialized Training
- Call-Taker and Dispatcher Protocols
- Stabilization, Observation, and Disposition
- Transportation and Custodial Transfer
- Information Exchange and Confidentiality
- Treatment, Supports, and Services
- Organizational Support
- Program Evaluation and Sustainability

The first step of meeting our demand is to establish a dedicated committee whose primary responsibility is to design, implement, and maintain a successful PMHC program. This committee would work with the <u>Technical Assistance (TA)</u> program of CSG Justice Center, research and clearly understand the exact needs of Redmond, receive regular input from community members, especially marginalized community members, and present drafts of program outlines to the Police Department Chief to be reviewed and approved. While the initial step of designing a PMHC program is extremely critical with a

series of long-term impacts, only a very small budget is required for such a committee to be successful. Anticipated costs may include trips to example agencies, hosting community engagement sessions, outreach, and recruitment for professional help.

We have given a handful of resources to jumpstart this process, though the burden lies with the police department to construct their own plan to meet this demand. This demand is very obtainable, and will have huge impacts for the community of Redmond. We expect this demand to be met before the end of December, 31st, 2021.

\*We have not been able to obtain data on RPD dispatcher calls statistics. KPD is an adjacent police department serving similar communities, and therefore can serve as a rough basis for RPD

### Demand 2

### We demand the establishment, fulfillment, and operation of a Redmond DEI Program Manager position

Redmond is not free from the systemic racism and bigotry that plagues the rest of the United States. Though the Redmond city council has set up programs in the past to fight against this racism and bigotry, there has been very little done to ascertain the actual extent of the problem. Most of the information on this subject requires digging deep into unofficial records, speaking to people working in public service, and anecdotal evidence. For example, there is clearly a disparity in housing. Due to the tiny Black population in Redmond, the average household income for Black residents is higher than the average for white residents, but the percent of Black residents without the ability to acquire an affordable home is higher than that of any other group. 13% of Black residents make less than \$20,000 a year, as opposed to 7.5% of the total population. Meanwhile, only 3% of housing costs per year are less than the \$6,000 that would be considered affordable for this income level in King County. This information, however, is not collected in one place. It's spread across multiple surveys on both government and non-government websites. Drug and homelessness numbers are even harder to find. Though talking to the city homelessness coordinator reveals that there are about 70 homeless individuals in Redmond, this number and its racial breakdown cannot be found on any official databases.

Cultural competency training in Redmond City employees is also relatively low. The target for 2020 has only 325 of the 711.92 full-time equivalent employees of the City of Redmond receiving training for equity and cultural competency, and the current plan only extends that number to 411 by 2022. With disparities such as the housing issue noted above, the city would benefit from higher training numbers.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion programs, often shortened to DEI, are programs that intend to cultural equality and human rights. Redmond's DEI efforts are carried out by a work group of representatives from different city departments, such as police, planning, and communications. As Mayor Birney recommended in her budget proposal, this system would benefit from a single DEI program manager, allowing these representatives to act more like liaisons. This position would create a more coordinated approach to Redmond DEI than has been available before.

Therefore, the Eastside Change Coalition makes the following three demands from the City of Redmond:

1. Approve Mayor Birney's budget proposal to move 1.00 full time equivalent employee from the police department to create a program manager position for the city's DEI efforts.

- a. As mentioned above, it is in the best interest of the city that this position is established.
- b. To fill this position, the City of Redmond must consult affected communities and local organizations. We believe that the best way for this first step of the city's DEI efforts to be successful and appropriate is to keep transparency in the appointment of this officer. We demand that this appointment is filled by someone who not only has experience working in Redmond, but also has education and authentic work credentials related specifically to diversity, equity and inclusion. We, the Eastside Change Coalition, would also like to be involved in this appointment process if possible.
- 2. Join the Government Alliance on Race and Equity (or GARE) and establish a plan overseen by the new DEI program manager to administer equity and cultural competency training to all Redmond City employees.
  - a. We believe that Redmond would benefit from the shared resources and support it would receive by becoming the first city on the Eastside to join GARE. Therefore, we request that Redmond set a plan to become a member of GARE in the near future. Membership FAQs can be found <a href="here">here</a>.
  - b. Redmond should use either the curriculum it's already administered, the one provided by GARE, or some combination of the two to set up a "train the trainer" program that could reasonably allow all city employees to receive equity and cultural competency training in the next few years. As this program continues, Redmond should consider making this training a required course taken by all new city employees, elected, hired, or appointed, at the beginning of their term.
- 3. Task the DEI program with identifying and carrying out informed plans to fight systemic racism and bigotry in Redmond
  - a. Redmond should appropriate funds to perform probes into what areas of race, gender, and sexual inequality must be addressed. This includes but is not limited to experiments, data analysis, and, most importantly, contact with communities most affected by race, gender, and sexual inequality. The information on inequality in Redmond needs to be gathered into a single document or government digest that citizens and city employees can use to make informed decisions.
  - b. Redmond then needs to come up with a toolkit that can be used to develop individualized plans to tackle each of these issues. This toolkit could be personally developed by Redmond, or could be based on the one administered by the Seattle Office of Civil Rights' Race and Social Justice Initiative found here.

In drafting these demands, we spoke with Mariko Lockhart, the director of the Seattle Office of Civil Rights. We feel that it will be necessary in expanding the powers and efforts of this diversity, equity, and inclusion officer for the city of Redmond to consult and study DEI offices of other cities. Seattle's office focuses mainly on civil rights enforcement, but its many programs related to DEI are an invaluable resource.

### Demand 3

### We demand the expansion of the Redmond Police Department's Community Equity Action Team

The ideas and experiences of members from the Redmond community are often being overlooked. This is the main reason why the Redmond Police Department (RPD) created the Community Equity Action Team (CEAT) in 2018.

During a CEAT meeting on Wednesday, 28 October 2020, it is clear that they are on the correct path to ensure that all members of the community have their voices heard. But two of the main demographics that were missing from the conversation were the youth and those of whom that have disabilities. The members of CEAT are aware of this and are working to recruit members of these demographics. They are currently working with Chanin Kelly-Rae to be more inclusive and equitable. However, CEAT needs to build a strategy that allows them to connect with more individuals to ensure that everyone from the community of Redmond has representation.

We demand that the Community Equity Action Team continues on the path that they are currently on. For recruitment, they should create smaller teams with individuals from certain demographics who can reach out to members of their smaller communities within Redmond to either have more entities of different demographics show up to team meetings to share their ideas and experiences with the group, or to have someone speak on their behalf.

If CEAT follows the advice of this demand, not only do we believe that the team will be more inclusive, we believe that the team will also be more equitable and will be able to foster the engagement of individuals from the Redmond community to build a better partnership between the Redmond Police Department and the people that they serve.

### Demand 4

## We demand that the Lake Washington School District abolish the SRO program, and reinvest the SRO budget into Community Wellness programs.

Police brutality is rampant across the nation. Here in Washington State, we have witnessed the deaths of Charleena Lyles, Shaun Fuhr, Manuel Ellis, and so many others all at the hands of cops. Just a month ago, 3 Redmond police officers shot and killed Andrea T. Churna, an innocent 39-year-old woman, in her own home. The countless murders of Black and brown people have made it incredibly clear that cops do not provide safety for our communities.

Black and brown students are disproportionately harmed and criminalized by police forces at schools. They represent 31% of school-related arrests in the United States and are 3 times more likely to be expelled than white students. Student Resource Officers (SROs) increase youth contact with the criminal punishment system by perpetuating the school-to-prison pipeline. According to the ACLU, this is a national trend where students are funneled from their public schools into juvenile and criminal justice

systems. Students who are punished for discretionary crimes are nearly 3 times more likely to end up in these systems the following year. Additionally, many of these children have learning disabilities and histories of trauma, abuse, and neglect. Instead of being provided access to mental health, counseling, social services, and other resources needed to heal, they are isolated and detained (ACLU).

Currently, the Lake Washington School District spends \$184,000 per year on SRO enforcement in schools (LWSD Budget Report). This is a huge sum of money that would be much better invested into valuable mental health services and resources that actually provide safety for the community. Police are only reactionary forces, they do not stop harm or violence but rather respond to it, often with brutality rather than de-escalation. Instead, the district can take steps to prevent crime and cultivate real safety by implementing holistic community wellness programs and hiring professional mental health counselors that are trauma-informed and trained in de-escalation.

As members of the Eastside Change Coalition, we demand that the Lake Washington School District permanently cuts all ties to police departments and invests in the mental health and wellbeing of their students and communities.

We demand that the school district do the following:

- Permanently abolish the SRO program. This includes the complete removal of all Student Resource Officers, Special Security Officers, and any other forms of police from every school within the district.
- 2) End all relationships to the Redmond, Kirkland, and Sammamish police departments as well as the King County Sheriff department. This includes their exclusion from all LWSD committees and an end to all recurring donations given to police foundations
- 3) Re-allocate these funds into student and community wellness by investing in mental and physical health services, hiring more counselors, nurses, and healers, and implementing transformative justice programs and holistic de-escalation spaces
- 4) Create a Community Wellness Committee led by Black, Indigenous, People of Color counselors, community members, and teachers to lead the implementation of community wellness initiatives, review programs already put in place, and decide on further solutions for providing student support.

SRO presence in our schools jeopardizes the safety, well-being, and futures of our students and communities especially our BIPOC members by adding to the racial traumas already impacting them and their families. While we acknowledge that members of the Lake Washington School District have had some positive interactions with our SROs, this does not excuse the harm, brutality, and criminalization of Black and brown people that continues to occur by police in our community.

### Demand 5

## We demand the allocation of funds to hire an additional homeless program coordinator for the City of Redmond.

A task force of one does not have the ability to strategize the response to homelessness for the entirety of Redmond. With a heavy reliance on community partners and mental health agencies, another homeless program coordinator would take this large load off the back of one person and could allow for more expansion and development of homeless programs rather than doing the bare minimum.

In an interview with Tisza Rutherford, we learned valuable information about her position and what it entails. Currently working with 128 individuals in total, Tisza has her hands full running around Redmond and other neighboring cities developing relationships with new faces while keeping contact flowing with familiar ones. We believe she is an important resource that is being spread far too thin which is not a sustainable way for her to continue being effective at her job.

As a task force of one within the planning department, her job includes strategizing the response to homelessness, patrolling areas of Redmond, and connecting the homeless population with resources. The police funnel all homeless cases to her, and from that point on, she is the main resource they have. How can only one person handle checking in with over 100 people all living in different areas or camps in neighboring cities? Her partnership with the police is a step in the right direction but without them having the ability to interact with homeless individuals they are just messengers and leave her with all the follow-up.

We believe the homeless population residing in the city of Redmond would benefit from another homeless coordinator that can balance out Tisza Rutherford's caseload. Having another point person would allow more strategizing of the larger homelessness issue rather than working only the day-to-day operations. We were told that there are allocated funds to hire another coordinator but that was not apparent on the city's budget report.

In your upcoming budget meetings, we request you strongly consider hiring another homeless coordinator or someone with similar responsibilities to balance the heavy caseload Tisza Rutherford currently has.

### Demand 6

# We demand the education and thorough training of local law enforcement to become a resource for the homeless population in the City of Redmond.

By requiring all current and future law enforcement to participate in de-escalation and mental health training they will be better equipped for unforeseen interactions while on duty. The ultimate goal of having law enforcement agencies is to maintain order and reduce violence and crime. Redirecting a portion of the budget towards paying for more extensive training would teach skills that could be useful on a day to day basis, and reduce the likelihood of unintentional harm to community members.

A better use of taxpayer money is shifting funding to social services such as mental health, addiction, and homelessness. Police spending should reflect what communities pay in exchange for public safety, to keep all communities safe. Giving them the skills to interact more personally within the community will allow there to be more trust and a resource that people feel safe approaching if necessary. Putting police officers closer to the homeless population would result in more direct relationships and ultimately having them feel more comfortable around law enforcement. Today, many law enforcement agencies are implementing direct outreach to homeless individuals and encouraging their officers to show compassion for homeless persons.

The homeless coordinator working for the city, Tisza Rutherford, is currently the point person for the homeless population in Redmond and needs more support. Providing your officers with this training could also make them a resource for her. When officers come into contact with a homeless individual, they funnel the case to her, and from that point on, she is the main resource they have. The city's partnership with the police is a step in the right direction but without them having the ability to interact with homeless individuals they are just messengers. At least presenting the option for officers to complete mental health and homeless training could greatly increase their positive contact with the homeless population.

The Cambridge Police Department in Massachusetts created Homeless Outreach Officers who focus on the contact everyday officers had with homeless individuals. Their focus is on specifically the homeless population in Cambridge and reducing the amount of nuisance behavior calls while improving the lives of everyone in the community. They understand that police are normally the first to interact with them and that creating a solid basis of communication and understanding would benefit both people in the future. They believe that officers who take the time to "know the individual are able to establish a rapport

[often lead] to referral for much needed health care services and [a] mutual understanding of desired outcomes" (Source 6).

By offering de-escalation or homeless training, you will be providing your officers with the skills to always be prepared for any situation that could arise.



We should not let such opportunities pass us by due to insufficient guidance to developers.

#### JUSTIFICATION FOR RECOMMENDED SCOPING OF OVERLAKE VILLAGE PARKS

Public Comments provided by Tom Hinman, November 5, 2020

There are several converging factors bearing on future Parks, Trails and Recreational facilities in Overlake Village. None entail capital investments, but all are related to Parks & Trails Commission topics with companion staff work plans for 2021 as well as City Council biennial budget deliberations currently in progress.

#### 1. Per the October 1, 2020 Parks and Trails Commission Minutes

**Esterra Park Staff Update:** Mr. Aken stated that the park improvements will have to be complete and accepted by the City prior to occupancy being granted for Phase 2A and 2B of the residential construction. There is not an exact date due to Covid-19. Discussion was held. Chair Smith noted that 90% of the development is built out and occupied without a park anywhere near them

#### 2. Per the Discussion Draft for Parks & Trails Commission 2021 Work Plan (to be presented November 5, 2020)

Esterra Park Master Plan (design) Provide input on park engineering design plans. Q2 2020
Seritage Park Master Plan (planning) Discussion and recommendation on park master plan (Motion) Q1-2 2020

#### 3. Per the Parks & Trails Budget Offer (0247) in Redmond's Proposed 2021-22 Budget

#### PARCC Plan Update (funded as above baseline request)

- Description: The PARCC Plan is the functional plan for the Parks and Recreation Department and serves as its strategic plan. Staff is proposing to work with a consultant to update and refine the existing PARCC plan including community engagement, updating maps and refining current service delivery.
- Amount: \$126,000 one-time
- Service Impact: An updated PARCC plan is required for obtaining grants from the Washington State Recreation and Conservation Office (RCO). The plan must be updated in the 2021-2022 biennium in order to meet the March 2023 deadline for RCO eligibility. It is also required for compliance in Redmond's comprehensive plan and serves as the department strategic plan.

#### Overlake Development Policies (from June, 2010 Overlake Village Implementation Plan)


**N-OV-19**—Develop regional stormwater treatment facilities within Overlake to treat and detain stormwater. Integrate facilities with parks and open spaces where feasible. Offer incentives to encourage public and private partnerships to develop these facilities.

**N-OV-22**—Promote the vision of the plazas, open spaces, parks, trails and pathways, and art in Overlake as being part of a cohesive system of public spaces that is integral to distinguishing Overlake as an urban "people place." Develop and maintain a variety of linkages, such as paths and way finding elements, among plazas, parks and open spaces in Overlake and in nearby neighborhoods that are within walking distance of each other.

**N-OV-66**—Integrate parks and open spaces with regional stormwater facilities where feasible. Connect any regional stormwater facilities with the park system in Overlake Village.

The adopted Overlake Neighborhood Plan includes broad goals and policies for the study area and proposes to create a sense of place in the Overlake Village through parks and open spaces connected by urban pathways, walkable streets, and landmark redevelopment projects, including key cornerstone sites in the neighborhood. The neighborhood plan encourages development of collocated stormwater and parks facilities to maximize public investment.

<u>Park and Open Space Needs</u> The conceptual design for the collocated stormwater and park facilities closely follows and promotes the vision for Overlake Village. The design proposes two publicly accessible parks (in addition to other parks and open spaces that may be developed on private sites in the neighborhood), as well as a connecting system of urban pathways that will connect the two parks and other public spaces (plazas, transit station, etc.) in Overlake Village. The urban pathway system will link people and places throughout the neighborhood and will also provide stormwater management benefits through rain gardens and underground infiltration galleries under the pathways.



#### 2017 PARCC Plan - Mid-term & Long-term Priority Projects:

Projects to be completed between 2022 & 2030

Overlake Village Park Development: The Overlake neighborhood has the largest employment population in Redmond and is projected to have the fastest growing residential neighborhood in the city. The majority of the planned growth is expected to occur in Overlake Village in the southern part of the neighborhood. As a result, the neighborhood needs more acres of neighborhood park land in the coming years to accommodate growing recreational needs. The City plans to develop two new parks in conjunction with the creation of stormwater facilities.

The North Village Park is one of two future parks in Overlake Village that will be built on top of regional stormwater vaults. Property is necessary for this park and stormwater vault and the ideal location is the block bounded by 151st, 152nd, 26th and 27th. This park is planned to be about two and 1/2 acres in size. Once the land is secured, a master plan will be developed for the park, so its specific amenities are undetermined. The public process to date has identified this park as a central gathering place in the large green given its central location, relatively flat topography and easy access from surrounding future developments. This park could be a place for performances, markets, and other events as well as an attractive lunchtime gathering place with amenities such as moveable tables and chairs, water feature, urban landscaping, and places for community engagement such as interactive art and play.

The <u>South Village Park</u> will also be built on top of a regional stormwater vault. Land for this park still needs to be secured, but the vault is already built on the west side of future Da Vinci (151st) Ave NE between NE 20th St and future NE Alhazen (22nd) St. This park is planned to be about two acres in size. There is no master plan for the park yet, so its specific amenities are undetermined. The public process to date has identified this park as a significant open space amongst the cityscape. Within the green are pockets of passive uses such as perennial gardens, p-patches or rain gardens, and more active areas for kicking a soccer ball, throwing a Frisbee, picnicking, playing a game of chess, shooting hoops, or swinging at the play area. The urban flavor reaches into the park at the Plaza, which serves as a transition or mixing zone between on- and off-site activities. It is the hub of community events that spill out across the green or into the pedestrian street. Tucked along the edge of the park, the refuge is a quieter zone that provides relief from the urban scene for individuals or small groups.

#### **Satellite Community & Recreation Center**

One of the fastest growing neighborhoods in the City is Overlake. The neighborhood is already the largest employment center in the city and is projected to move from the third largest residential neighborhood in the City to the first by 2020. Community members recognize this and have requested a satellite community center and recreation facility in the neighborhood as it grows. Overlake Village, the residential urban center, is located at the southern tip of the neighborhood, far from Downtown, making use of Downtown recreation centers unlikely for this planned pedestrian oriented community. This center is likely to include a gymnasium, fitness rooms, community meeting rooms, a general social living room area and other amenities. This could be a stand-alone facility or a partnership with a developer or another jurisdiction. It is estimated that the building would be approximately 20,000 square feet.




Figure 2-1 Overlake Village Sub-Area Map






Parks Planning Map of June, 2010...note Urban Pathway (in Green) Connecting the Parks

Our expert staff provide early intervention like speech therapy or physical therapy, developmental screenings, educational trainings for our Redmond partners, parent education, family support, specialized playgroups and important connections to basic needs services. FIT complements the vital work of other organizations that meet the basic needs of our families and children experiencing homelessness in Redmond.

Kindering sincerely thanks the City of Redmond for decades of funding support. Thank you for recommending support for Kindering's FIT program. Because of COVID's significant impact on children and families already experiencing significant toxic stress due to housing and financial instability, FIT is more important today than ever before.

So far this year, despite a few months of slowed services due to COVID, we have doubled our annual goal and already served 14 Redmond families through FIT services and many others through our relationships with

community organizations serving Redmond; for example, Catholic Community Services, Child Care Resources, Community Court, Eastside Baby Corner, Friends of Youth, Hopelink, Lake Washington School District, Public Health and YWCA. We also provided educational training to LifeWire around understanding and supporting a young child's behaviors after exposure to domestic violence.

FIT services are customized to address the high rate of developmental delays in children under age 5 without stable housing: 75% have at least one major developmental delay and 50% have two or more. Helping overcome developmental delays at an early age provides tremendous long-term benefit to the children and cost savings for the school districts.

COVID has increased children's stress levels and risk factors. Children are experiencing changes to home, family and school routines. They may be absorbing the stress, fears and worries of the adults around them. They may be receiving less one on one attention, play, and quality time from their caregivers. Children experiencing toxic stress show their feelings through behavior such as crying, refusing to comply with directions, clinginess, decrease in communication, increased tantrums and difficulty with separation. These stressors and related behaviors are added to already stressful experience of living in housing instability—in shelters, couch surfing or even living in cars within our community.

Good evening, Mayor and Council.

My name is Rosemarie Ives.

Because the council has had only a few sessions on the budget with more to come, I request that the public hearing be kept open so that the viewing public has the opportunity to hear more of the council's deliberations. A better informed public will provide more meaningful input resulting in better decisions made by the council.

During my 16 year tenure as Mayor of Redmond, I had major responsibility for ten annual and biennial budgets. I know what it takes to have a financial document that actually tells the public what the city is doing and what the city believes is important to accomplish during the specified budget cycle.

The present administration has chosen to continue the Budgeting by Priorities model. Over the past 12 years, I have reviewed several of those budget documents. My observations then, and again now, are that the council and indirectly the public fall into a reactive mode—that is, they are distracted by "offers" that the administration wants approved. There is a tendency to spend a great deal of time asking questions about the offers which represent just a sliver of the city's work. As a result, the council has little discussion with staff about what is or isn't going on in each department. The council and the

public hear little from departments as to what is important to accomplish over the next two years, what may have changed, what has been done away with and why.

I recognize that the pandemic has created a most volatile situation that none of us have ever experienced. We have no knowledge of how our situation, individually and collectively, will unfold. Though I have not had extensive time to delve into the intricacies of this budget, one would think that the most prudent way for the City to proceed would be with caution, and in the case of finances, careful, thoughtful and frugal during a time of great uncertainty.

In my cursory review of the budget, my initial impression was just the opposite—it's "business as usual" at City Hall with a General Fund increase close to \$4 million, a projected 9% increase in property tax revenue and an expenditure increase of 5% overall...Taking in more money and spending more money!

It is difficult to comprehend that since the beginning of COVID, not a single permanent city employee has been laid off or had hours reduced! I know there are many employees, because of the nature of their work, were actually working full time. However, there are many employees who in no way had "full time" work throughout the eight month period from March to the present but continued to get paid full time. This is not right! Why didn't the council question/challenge this?

In the budget, the decrease in the number of employees is only 26 out of 713—under a 3% reduction that is negligible to say the least. Yet, Salaries and Wages are up 6% and Training is up 67%!

What I didn't see reflected in this CIP budget was the addressing of the 2018 McKinstry report that identified 20 out of 27 city buildings being in "poor or worse than poor" condition. This is an important and urgent issue! It was shocking to read about a 23% reduction in Repairs and Maintenance. We know what happens when city buildings are not maintained and money is diverted to "pet projects." https://www.redmond-reporter.com/letters/why-was-downtown-park-so-costly-letter/

Look at the abrupt demise of the Senior Center! Where in this budget is the analysis of the list of city buildings with prioritized deficiencies, associated cost and timeline for repair?

I also noted that there was no statistically valid community survey this year. What a missed opportunity to hear from the people of Redmond who might have provided more and different insight during these troubling times! It could have informed the mayor and council about how their priorities may have changed and given the city an opportunity to course correct.

When we know that people and businesses in Redmond have cut back out of necessity or by choice, have been saving more, paying off debts, scaling back spending, the City should have been doing likewise.

Please give serious consideration to my comments and adopt a budget that is more prudent and frugal than what is before you. The budget should reflect the times! Thank you.

Subject: November 12 Ives' Input on 2021-22 budget

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#### Dear Council members,

Thank you for continuing to keep the public hearing on the 2021-22 budget open until November 17th. I suggest that you **consider keeping the public hearing open beyond November 17th** because at this point in time it is impossible for any one from the public to prepare for the council deliberations specifically on the budget that was scheduled for this past Tuesday, November 10th, and your session tonight, November 12th. **The agenda available on line for both sessions just says "Biennial Budget" but there is no other information as to what part of the budget council members will be considering.** So the listening public is put in the position of reacting to what they hear at the time of the meeting rather than reading, reviewing and reflecting on particular sections of the budget ahead of time so they might submit /listen for answers to their questions or concerns. That leaves anyone slightly interested in providing the council with input little time to do so.

So here's a random list of issues/concerns/opposition.

On Page 11, there is reference to an **annual telephone survey**. I introduced a statistically valid survey as one of several tools that I used to inform my budgetary recommendations over 25 years ago. It was administered in the spring before I made my final recommendations. Unfortunately, the most recent City survey was done in early 2019 by the previous administration and nothing in 2020. As I testified last week, what a lost opportunity that **reflects an administration that prevented the public from expressing their opinions and comprehensive assessment of what all city departments do or don't do, making choices when there may be competing interests for the same pot of money.** 

To complicate matters more, the 2019 survey was done with a majority of department directors who are no longer at the city and knowledge and the present group of department directors lack Redmond institutional experience as well as previous department director experience. It also demonstrates that the council was not providing its fiduciary oversight that was/is particularly important during this pandemic and its potentially long term impacts. What is council going to do in the midst of "this perfect storm?"

Since Salaries and Benefits constitute the largest expenditure in the budget other than the Capital Improvement Program, I cannot object enough about City employees who are not working full time being paid for full time work with monies coming from the public. All department directors should be carefully scrutinizing and supervising their divisions and in writing substantiating every employee's work plan in detail that documents how many hours are actually being worked.

As a mayor who had to cut almost 10% in my first budget, I gathered the leadership of all four unions and explained directly and clearly that cuts were necessary and that it was in their best interests to help in doing their part. After more than eight months, I haven't heard of the present administration taking any steps to get the unions' cooperation in assessing all the options available that are required when salaries and benefits are being underwritten by the public. **The number of positions proposed to be cut is a "token gesture."** When I read that one of the cuts is "**Emergency Program Coordinator**" with an

explanation that other departments will provide "expertise", as the mayor who initially established "emergency preparedness" positions, I am frightened for the community. What I know is that this assignment demands staff whose sole responsibility is our safety!

Again, the **Capital Improvement Program as presented is convoluted and obscured**, divided into four perhaps interesting categories: Downtown, Overlake, Neighborhoods and city wide. The public has not seen what was promised/planned in six previous budgets over 12 years, only what is being worked on and is planned over the coming six year period. Again, a reactionary role to what is being proposed but no accountability as to what was promised. The public cannot see how much money is going to each project in what specific years from what sources.

It was two years ago in December 2018 that the startling McKinstry Report that had been worked on for almost two years prior to it finally being released. "20 out of the City's 27 buildings are in "worse or poor than worse" condition. The previous administration was well aware of the McKinstry "verdict" in advance of budgetary decisions but did little if anything to address it in the last budget. Though the report was released, there was hardly any discussion about the very serious threat and how the City would proceed. What was worse is that the then council sat by doing nothing. It was nine months later that the Senior Center was closed abruptly. And as of yet I have not seen a plan laid out that identifies and prioritizes the severity of each building, what needs to be remediated, the costs associated with the remediation, sources of revenue and the timeline from start to completion. This must be dealt with and decided upon before any decisions are made about the senior center or any dreams of a community center.

The failure of the previous administration to maintain the city's existing buildings was no surprise to me as was reflected and now documented in my September, 2018 Redmond Reporter Letter to the Editor, two months before the release of the McKinstry report. Unfortunately, a majority of the council members then were complicit with the administration when they didn't scrutinize the budget, didn't adopt an implementation plan that directed funds to fix the 20 buildings. It is the present council's job now to fix this and to act now to make sure that our buildings are safe for our employees and for the public that may use them or benefit from them before any other buildings are added to the inventory of our city buildings.

With regard to the discussion about a community center--I am opposed at this time to issuing councilmanic bonds for a community center. A community center is a "nice to have" not "important and urgent" as are the 20 city building in poor conditions. Unfortunately, the previous administration was responsible for many missteps from encouraging the Lake Washington School District to break the 40 year lease of ORSCC midway at twenty years that I negotiated to the outrageous expenditure of \$41 million on the downtown park.

Going back more than 12 years, neighborhoods west of the Sammamish River were underserved when it came to parks and recreation facilities and programming. It is imperative for the city to do a comprehensive analysis where growth has happened recently and will happen, what public facilities including schools are available and what programming needs are and are anticipated.

I realize you have a session tonight so I want to get this off to all of you for your review though I have no idea what issues you will be discussing tonight.

Here are a couple of issues that I will not elaborate on here but should be discussed by the council:

- 1. Council should not take the automatic 1% increase on property taxes in this budget cycle. Property taxes are enjoying a healthy increase due to all the new construction that is coming on line--how much is that ?
- 2. Regarding "affordable housing": I believe there were two items that totaled close to \$8 million dollars. Though I was a founding member of ARCH and chaired the executive board, I now strongly oppose both at this time because: the people who already live in Redmond don't need housing unless

they want to change their housing choice. The reason that prices have escalated is because the demand is coming from businesses who want to grow in Redmond.

Both the private and public sectors have a role. But the way the City has been approaching the challenge is by throwing millions of dollars toward developers and some well intended non profits with the outcome of actual number of units being miniscule compared to the need however that is defined.

First, It is time for the businesses to take responsibility for the "crisis" they created by underwriting housing for the employees that they have or are bringing to Redmond.

Secondly, the City should do a comprehensive analysis of its present housing stock, all forms, choices, price categories, etc. The analysis should look at what the City wants to have for housing in the future. Does the City leadership want a balance between single family and multi family--50/50 or 70/30 or 30/70 or in product choices and what's the desired ratio between "owned" versus "rental"? If the city leadership can get clarity on these two figures through an analysis, then the City can frankly tell the developers what it wants. There is no need for "incentives" other than if they want to develop what we want, they are welcome. If not, there are other places for them to do business.

This should be enough for this afternoon.! I know how hard this work is...much easier to "rubber stamp" than to "delliberate." It takes time to not only deliberate on what is before you but more important is to deliberate on what is not before you. As I suggested previously, the "offers are only a sliver of what the city does".... You have until the end of the year. With all the challenges before the City, time for deliberation should be the course of action.

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#### Varisha et al -

Thanks for the opportunity to dialogue a bit with you on matters of civic betterment. I know that Council has a lot of important things to do, but I also think that this conversation has value for the whole community. (I don't see this as part of the budget deliberations...it's more focused on process improvements in general and the Council procedures in particular.) The core of this matter is how to deal with expectations raised by the invitation to comment on community matters.

I guess part of this conversation is how to inject comments and thoughtful suggestions into the wider discourse in Redmond. I realize that there are protocols to consider. How does staff know if/when/how to respond to citizens when their time is managed through their superiors? What leverage does Council have to get responses to questions originated by citizens without seeming biased to those views or to impinge on the prerogatives of the Mayor? Can community members propose items for the Council to consider by relevant Committees of the Wholes or other vehicle...like Commissions? Are Items from the Audience the only way to bring topics to the attention of the Council.....and how does Council respond to such items beyond a silent nod from the dais or on Teams? Who and how does either staff or citizens reach out on specific issues....beyond the budget but perhaps including concerns on development projects? How does the ombudsperson try to referee all the stuff that comes their way? Where does the Communication team fit in all this?

My sense is that a citizen may need to ask a specific question in order to get a specific response. I have, for many years, given public comments that do not contain a question but do point to specific matters in some degree of detail. They have not generated substantive responses on points raised...only the occasional acknowledgement that my comments were received. Maybe a response like "Thank you for your comments. We considered them in reaching a decision to (incorporate/not incorporate)

them in our way forward because..... Should you have additional questions, please contact ..... for additional information."

Back on budget matters....inquiries into performance metrics is a good way to quantify progress on various issues. That may take more time and effort than one might think to identify the metrics, determine where/how those metrics could be found and the relative importance of each. Community surveys with self-selected respondents should only be one factor in these metrics. I hope that both objective and subjective measures can be found that help guide the City in shaping current and future priorities.

Finally, some insights into when and how "parking lot" issues or future deliberations will be scheduled or considered -- before or after approval of this budget -- would be appreciated.

Thank you again for your service to the community and for considering these remarks.

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Councilmember Kritzer and Redmond Council -

As you launch into review of the Strategic and Responsive priority of the budget this evening, I would respectfully draw your attention to a process question embedded in my previous comments that is appropriate for Council consideration <u>apart from budget allocations</u>. It deals with the Public Comment Matrix.

Omitted in staff's summary of my comments on November 2, 2020 as appearing in the Public Comment Matrix is the following:

On the subject of the Public Comment Matrix, under the column headed "Status"....is there an expectation that comments from the community will be addressed in a substantive manner or simply have their receipt acknowledged by staff?

As in prior budget years, public comment is earnestly solicited and thoughtfully aggregated by staff for the information of Council in their deliberations. Also as in previous budgets, the topic is mentioned in summary, an acknowledgment may be sent (but not always), after which the community member may wonder if or how their concerns are being considered.

Further from my comments of November 2, 2020:

I applaud the new Community Satisfaction Rating contained in the Strategic and Responsive priority. Per my earlier comments of October 16, 2018 as extracted in my public comments of October 2020 under:

<u>Citywide Communications and Community Outreach & Involvement</u> – Strategic and Responsive Objective #2 is to "connect with the local and regional community through broad and inclusive communication and public engagement strategies." This Objective is in the spirit of the <u>Community Engagement priority</u> in the previous budget cycle with a Performance Measure defined as "Percentage of community members responding they feel that the City is listening and responding positively to their feedback."

Redmond's <u>Community Involvement Guidebook</u> of 2019 cites the following as Core Belief #7:

"Community members should know how their input and feedback was used in the decision-making process."

I sincerely believe that process improvement is warranted in this matter as well as in fostering a greater two-way communication between Council and the community as I have expressed in July, 2020 during the update of Council procedures.

Councilmember Kritzer, I'd like to thank you and the staff for shepherding the budget process to date. It is always a challenge, made even more difficult by loss of revenue and the need to conduct business is the current sterile environment. I would much rather be giving these remarks from the podium at City Hall. I'm sure that you, like many, wish we were able to relate more directly in the exchange of views critical to our community wellbeing.

Good evening Mayor Birney and Council Members,

My name is Devon Kellogg. I am a teacher, a parent, a PTSA member and a longtime Redmond resident. I am speaking to you today, on behalf of myself and the children in my care, in support of efforts to address climate change through the Environmental Sustainability Action Plan and the 2021-22 budget.

First, I would like to thank you for acknowledging the growing threat of climate change if we do not rapidly curb our greenhouse gas emissions, and for making robust and timely plans to do so. As we all know from an abundance of high-profile studies, significant and immediate efforts to reduce these warming emissions are crucial to protecting the "healthy" and "vibrant" vision for Redmond that we all share and securing a livable future for our children.

I do not think anyone envisions smoke-filled skies, heat waves, dying vegetation, high pollen counts, pest infestations, high lake bacteria and toxin levels, or flooded streets as a healthy environment for our schools, families, or businesses. The physics of climate change demands we hit ZERO emissions in the next few decades or sooner to avoid even more dire effects. There is no way to accomplish this if we delay. It must be a priority, as stated in your recent Climate Emergency Declaration.

I would also like to point out that a lot of other community members share our concerns about this critical issue. Last month, Washington State PTA members voted overwhelmingly, at their legislative assembly and via surveys sent to all members, to support "Mitigating the Adverse Impacts of Climate Change" and "Mitigating the Health Effects of Climate Change" on our kids. #### 11.28 Mitigating the Health Effects of Climate Change

Resolution passed 2018; amended 2020

Whereas, a primary focus of PTA is the health and well-being of every child; and

Whereas, Washington State PTA has resolutions addressing the causes of and reducing the effects of external pollutants for asthma, health care for all children and youth, mitigating environmental hazards, and increasing access to mental health; and legislative principles that support increased access to health care for children and youth, mental health parity, school nutrition, and effective prevention and intervention programs; and

Whereas, multiple national and international agencies have published scientific research on adverse health effects of climate change on children (dehydration; heat exhaustion, cramps or stroke; trauma from extreme weather like floods, fire or storms; increased lung disease and illness from infectious diseases; malnutrition), including the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), the National Institutes of Health (NIH), Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), World Health Organization (WHO), National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences (NIEHS), and the U.S. Global Change Research Program; and

Whereas, NIH research shows that climate change increases airborne allergens and pollution; affects the ecology and temperature of a region, resulting in increased disease vectors such as mosquitoes, ticks, and flies; may be associated with staple food shortages, malnutrition, and food contamination; affects changes in coastal ecosystem health that could increase the incidence of water contamination with harmful pathogens and chemicals; and

Whereas, the NIEHS reports that, "strategies for mitigating and adapting to climate change can prevent illness and death in people now, while also protecting the environment and health of future generations;" and

Whereas, the WHO reports that, "Today, humankind's activities are altering the world's climate. We are increasing the atmospheric concentration of energy-trapping gases, thereby amplifying the natural 'greenhouse effect' that makes the Earth habitable. These greenhouse gases (GHGs) comprise, principally, carbon dioxide (mostly from fossil fuel combustion and forest burning), plus other heat-trapping gases such as methane (from irrigated agriculture, animal husbandry, and oil extraction), nitrous oxide and various human-made halocarbons;" and

Whereas, the WHO concludes that, "Unprecedentedly, today the world population is encountering unfamiliar human-induced changes in the lower and middle atmospheres and world-wide depletion of various other natural systems (e.g., soil fertility, aquifers, ocean fisheries, and biodiversity in general). Beyond the early recognition that such changes would affect economic activities, infrastructure, and managed ecosystems, there is now recognition that global climate change poses risks to human population health"; and



Whereas, the global urgency to address climate change increased when the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change concluded that at the current rate of warming, the global warming will reach 1.5°C between 2030 and 2052, that any risks due to climate change will increase further with a 2°C change, and that the national mitigation goals of the Paris Agreement won't limit global warming to 1.5°C; and

Whereas, uncoordinated and incomprehensive government actions in Washington state addressed greenhouse gas emissions (GHGE) and climate change, with the state of Washington enacting legislation to reduce anthropogenic (manmade) GHGE specifically for state agencies to 95% below 1990 levels and achieve net zero GHGE, and the King County Council, updated its Strategic Climate Action Plan (SCAP) for cities to voluntarily adapt and reduce regional GHGE and prepare for climate change impacts, especially in communities severely impacted by climate change; and

Whereas, National PTA has had a position statement on Environmental Health, Remediation, Sustainability and Climate Change since 2003, recognizing "the scientific consensus surrounding climate change and the impact of human activities. Children represent a particularly vulnerable group already suffering disproportionately from both direct and indirect adverse health effects of anthropogenic global warming" and that "PTA members have a responsibility to promote environmental health and safety, and to help protect our world's finite natural resources."

#### Therefore, be it

**Resolved**, that Washington State PTA and its local PTAs and councils urge national, state and local policymakers to acknowledge that climate change is a health crisis that disproportionately and adversely impacts children and youth, and to adopt and enforce legislation that enables people to adapt to climate change and mitigates the effects of climate change, and that uses market forces, incentives, and regulations to sequester carbon and reduce emissions of CO<sub>2</sub> and GHGs with the goal of slowing, halting, and reversing climate change; and be it further

**Resolved**, that Washington State PTA encourages and calls for members, policymakers in government, inter-governmental bodies and non-governmental, school and community organizations to raise awareness and advocate for increased research to reduce and mitigate adverse health effects resulting from climate change; and be it further

**Resolved**, that Washington State PTA promotes utilization of the existing K-12 Integrated Environmental and Sustainability Education Learning Standards, including educating students on climate and energy literacy and human sustainability; and educates its members on how to calculate their carbon footprint, ways they can reduce their carbon footprint, such as green and clean energy changes they can make in their lives; and be it further

**Resolved**, that Washington State PTA and its local PTAs and councils urge policymakers to take action to make schools and communities more energy-efficient, including the use of renewable, sustainable energy and technologies, to provide funding and technical assistance to jurisdictions to develop, adopt and implement Strategic Climate Action Plans (SCAP) that focus on reducing school district, city, county and regional GHGE and prepare for climate change impacts, especially those communities severely impacted by climate change, and to enact environmentally healthy land-use policies that take into account the geographic, economic, ethnic, cultural, and other societal factors that influence the incidence, exposure, and effects of environmental health hazards.

My name is Scott Axworthy, since 1986 my family has lived at the far end of Homestead Drive, or 151st as it is primarily known. First I'd like to take a moment to lament that old Project 189, the stairway to Redmond Way appears to be completely gone from the planning documents now. We are so close, but so far, to downtown Redmond. That connection, and the opportunities it would have afforded us for walking access to public transit and the core of our community is a sad loss for us. But the second project, the one that many of us are trying to raise the priority on today is Project B96/GL184, sidewalks on 151st Ave NE. As the name Homestead Drive implies, our road has been here a while and it shows. We have to agree with former city council member Hank Meyer's 2018 comment after his visit, "This is one of those places where you go in and say, 'Is this really part of Redmond?" Our long narrow street is starting to transform, as early Redmond houses are demolished and modern houses built. But our street is a flashback to the 1960's. We can no longer say we don't have any sidewalks, we do have one orphan of a sidewalk in front of a single house, 3/4's the way down the street, leading to, well, nowhere. Because of the older homes, we tend to have more rentals. The rentals tend to have more occupants that drive. Because of our long road, cars tend to speed down our road. Narrow roads with no sidewalks and fast cars are not people friendly. While we no longer have young kids walking to local schools, I'm a runner. I try to stay well away from traffic at all times. Oddly, heading up and down our street is the hardest path along my entire nine-mile route to avoid traffic! Since Covid-19, my wife, working from home walks up and down in our street three times a day. She's not the only one, foot traffic seems to have actually increased during the pandemic. Because we have a dead-end street, we must travel the entire distance to get to any destination. And we are fortunate to have a public transit stop at the head of our street, just no sidewalks to safely get there. As the project is defined now, it is only for sidewalks to run from Old Redmond Road halfway down 151st. At a minimum, please consider one of the plan alternatives to run the full length of 151st on just one side. I invite you all to come visit Homestead Drive to see for yourselves first-hand. Take a walk down our street and please drop by 7889 for a (socially distant) chat. Thank you for your consideration. Prioritize basic safety! I would like to voice my support and sincere request to add sidewalks to 151st Ave NE. Walking on the street is not a fun experience as you must constantly watch for cars. The other factor is economics. There are a few of the '100 year old' homes sitting on their original acre that would love to be subdivided. But with current code, the builder must add a sidewalk out front (that's fine), but also must connect it to the closest sidewalk - in this case Old Redmond Road. For some properties that is half a mile of sidewalk and countless properties and there is no way a developer will take that on.

In lieu of oral remarks at the pubic hearing tonight, please accept the following comment on the proposed budget:

This reemphasizes my comment in email of November 5th regarding Parks and Trails projects. Impending planning for the park in Overlake's Esterra project adds urgency to early, holistic review of **all** projected parks in the vicinity of Overlake Village. Park/neighborhood planning in the context of the 2050 Comprehensive Plan is out of phase with this near-term, consultant-led effort. (Offer #0247 germane.)

I strongly recommend that a modest degree of proactive, integrated review and preliminary scoping of all the Overlake parks, urban pathways and recreation facilities be undertaken as an initial phase to be incorporated in the upcoming PARCC Plan Update. I am not recommending capital investments at the moment, only some emphasis on an early planning process so that investments by others can be properly applied as we weave a fabric within which community building can take place. We should not let such opportunities pass us by due to insufficient guidance to developers.



Dear Redmond City Clerk,

I wish to provide verbal public comment for the "2021 - 2022 Biennial Budget Public Hearing" portion of the November 17, 2020, regular business meeting of the Redmond City Council. I intend to read some actions from King County and the K4C's Climate Action Toolkit to reduce greenhouse gas emissions associated with **City government operations**.

During Items from the Audience this evening, I can be reached at 206-909-5680.

My 498-word comment is attached as a Word document and is inserted in the body of this email below.



Because the Redmond City Council approved a climate emergency declaration, because it would be good to hear recommendations made by the <u>Climate Action Toolkit from King County and the K4C</u>, and because a goal of this hearing is to gather input about City priorities before the budget is adopted, I'll read from the Toolkit some actions that can be taken to reduce greenhouse gas emissions associated with <u>City government operations</u>.

1) Adopt a <u>business travel policy</u> to limit unnecessary air travel, inter-city travel, and intra-city travel (utilize teleconferencing instead); explore carbon offsets for remaining necessary travel.

- 2) Create **stewardship plans** for all city-owned or city-managed farmland and forested sites above an appropriate threshold.
  - From the top of towering Douglas-firs down to the leafy ferns in the understory, forests are an iconic symbol of our home here in King County. These forestlands are important for our everyday lives improving air and water quality, and providing places for us to hike, bike, ride a horse, or just sit and enjoy the view.
  - <u>Working forests</u> provide many social and economic benefits for communities, including jobs and wood products, and provide sites for forestry education.
- 3) Allow multiple teleconferencing options to employees and city stakeholders and offer <u>virtual</u> <u>options for all meetings by default</u>.
- 4) Require <u>permeable pavement</u> for all new construction & remodels to reduce stormwater runoff and costs. Determine a minimum percent of stormwater that should be managed with <u>impervious surfaces</u>, <u>Salmon-Safe standards</u>, and sustainable stormwater strategies by 2030.
- 5) Update the city's <u>telecommuting policy</u> to foster increased utilization of this commute option whenever it meets city business needs.
- 6) Identify costs of <u>landscape maintenance</u>, such as water and the service crew, work with landscapers to transition to <u>native</u>, <u>drought-tolerant landscapes</u>, and use smart infrastructure when needed during first establishment phase. <u>Smart infrastructure includes</u> <u>drip irrigation and smart controllers that integrate rain sensors</u>. The intention is to keep valuable partners but educate and transition them to new practices.
- 7) Protect and enhance <u>local natural resources</u>, such as water bodies, flood plains, healthy soils, natural areas, vegetated areas and corridors, <u>that provide multiple benefits</u> like carbon capture; reducing flood, landslide, stormwater and heat island impacts; cooling and purifying water and air; and improving public health and biodiversity.
- 8) Join <u>Puget Sound Energy's Green Power Program</u>, unless you're already signed up for Green Direct.
- 9) Conduct <u>energy audits</u> in all city owned and operated buildings; partner with the local utility and private contractors.
- 10) Incorporate **environmental justice criteria** and priorities into zoning, land use planning, permitting policies, and development of new projects. Address disparities in public health impacts using best available data.
- 11) Identify partners that will purchase or receive (as donations) salvaged materials such as brass fixtures, steel piping, appliances, furniture, and equipment from renovated buildings or whenever there is furniture turnover.

12) Evaluate the <u>sequestration potential</u> of existing public lands and invest in changes and recommendations that enable high sequestration levels or carbon sinks, particularly mature, temperate conifer forest land.

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
Mayor, Council & Budget Committee,

Since the pandemic has drastically altered the presentation format for citizens, I wanted to provide the additional materials I would have used in an in-person meeting. I hope they help you understand the seriousness of the safety issue we are raising.


Since both Joy and I took only 2 minutes each for our comments, I think it's not too much to ask you to spend 2 minutes more to understand our situation.

- 1. 1 minute: Please open the attached PowerPoint and flip through the slides. The references to our project, city code and actual measurements are detailed there.
- 2. 1 minute (literally): Please watch <u>this youtube video</u> that shows the street (from ground level and air) and some interactions between cars and pedestrians on our street.

Not only do we not have sidewalks, but our street is far narrower than the 28' required by city zoning. You can see this for yourself with Google Maps' measurement tool and the King County parcel viewer measurement tool.



Using standard allocations for traffic (12') and parking (8'), you can see that all 20' of our street is occupied when a car drives past a parked car. Pedestrians have nowhere to go. This is demonstrated in the video.



Please think about the neighborhood you live in and your street. Are you required to walk *in traffic* to walk down your street? We are. We have little option to walk on the shoulders, because most open shoulder space is occupied with parked cars. (you can see this in the YouTube video). And the street that we must walk in is far narrower than standard Redmond neighborhood streets as demonstrated above and in the PPT deck.

Please don't let our project continue to slip into the future indefinitely. Please make a **decision to improve our safety now** and not leave it to future councils to solve. Institutional memory is not strong enough to last that long.


Our drainage on the street is such that it will add another 2+ feet of unwalkable space as the water sits on the road.


The mailboxes create the need to walk in the street. The cars and landscaping up to the edge of the road do too.





As a long-time resident of the city, I, along with many in my neighborhood, welcome and celebrate the city recycling events. The significance of such events goes way beyond the few times of collection and recycling efforts from the city. It sends a strong message from the city to its residents that our community values recycling as an integral part of our nationwide environmental protection movement. Equivalently, cancellation of these events indicates that our city no longer wishes to participate at the grassroot

level to preserve our land and our resources. This message comes at odds with many other beneficial endeavors our city government has implemented over the years and it risks neutralizing or reversing many progresses our city has made in the area of environmental preservation. I am genuinely saddened by this sudden setback and feel distressed enough to write to all of you urging you to reconsider this decision.

Last, but not least, we shall not overlook the foreseeable burden this might create on our community members, especially those low-income households. Recycling events, sponsored by the city, provide economical means for community members to participate in recycling efforts. When such assistance is pulled back, community members will be required to seek such services elsewhere, which, almost always, means higher costs and subsequently lower usage. Families in the low-income category will especially suffer from their lack of resources to participate in recycling. Take the mattress recycling for instance. The typical cost of taking back a mattress at our city recycling events is around \$15, while it costs over \$80 to have it picked up by a garbage collection agency (like Waste Management).

Understandably, the pandemic has brought in unprecedented hardship to our city budget and many items are forced to be cut. It is my hope that our city government does not neglect one of our main focuses as an environmentally conscious and active community and strives to support our environment during this difficult time. Dear Mayor Birney,

Because of the nature of my inquiry and request for information, I am writing to you because I am uncertain as to whom on your staff can respond quickly...whether it is the Finance Director or the Public Works Director who during my tenure had responsibility for all city facilities. I am also including Councilmember Kritzer, council Finance chair, who is facilitating council budget deliberations as well as including the rest of the council.

The budget process has been very difficult to follow even for someone like myself. It has been impossible to know what and when the council would be discussing or had discussed many issues that are related to the budget. So it prevented the opportunity for the public to submit questions or concerns in a timely manner to the council.

With the abrupt closure of the Senior Center in September of 2019 and now upon my return to Redmond after several months away the reality of the center's demolition, the McKinstry Report of December, 2018 is ever present in my mind. I read the report two years ago. It very clearly stated that 20 out of 27 city buildings were in "poor or worse than poor" condition. I cannot think of any other Capital Improvement Project of more importance and urgency than assuring that city buildings are safe for employees and for the public.

I have read through the 2021-22 budget. I cannot find any specific information about the McKinstry Report, nor an updated analysis of the remaining 19 buildings in "poor or worse than poor" condition. nor planned expenditures within the next two years of the proposed budget as well as what expenditures are planned for the following four years, consistent with the City's six year horizon for its capital improvement plan.

It appears that the council has been discussing many different and often disparate issues and are nearing a final vote on the budget...though it's only the beginning of the second week of December with lots of time to complete the final approval of a budget before the end of the month. These issues are like pieces of a jigsaw puzzle, each issue having its own identity and associated costs. And now the pieces are coming together so that each councilmember can assess what the "big" picture is and whether or not it best addresses the priorities of the community.

So I hope, Mayor Birney, that you will see to it that the appropriate staff will get back to me with the information. It would be helpful also to know if/when staff briefed the council on the McKinstry Report in this 2021-22 budget process. Though I understand that the public hearing has been closed, I intend to email all of them with my opinion on the single most important capital need.

Dear Redmond Mayor and City Council:

Was extremely disappointed on City Council's action at latest 12/3/20 meeting regarding the passing of a new financial policy limiting future CIP projects to a debt-to-equity ratio of 1 to 1.

Your passing of this new policy puts the recommended 42-million-dollar expenditure by Redmond Senior

Center Stakeholders and Redmond Parks and Recreation at risk.

Making this change in 11<sup>th</sup> hour of the budget approval without community input makes the Council look

less than transparent and makes Stakeholders think you have a different view of what the Senior/Community

Center should be. Am hoping that was not your intent.

As I understand it, your new financial policy would limit the City from issuing debt for the rebuild of the Redmond Senior/Community Center to a 30 million expenditure unless we seek a levy vote or get significant

"outside contributions" from other sources (e.g., State of Washington or an outside partnership).

If this is not your intended action, please explain and give Stakeholders guidance so we can feel assured we still

are on track for a projected 42-million-dollar expenditure to replace the Senior/Community Center.

But if our assumptions are correct..., your action is not suitable and ask you to rethink your decision.

May I remind you, those "outside contributions" mentioned above are uncertain and the Senior/Community

Center needs to move forward with assumption..., the City well need to fully fund the 42-million-dollar amount.

While I support Councils view to have financial policies to maintain reasonable controls, such as a prudent

debt to equity ratio, I would point out this should be an <u>overall measurement and NOT a strict standard</u> applied

on a project-by-project basis. By doing so, it really limits Redmond's flexibility of using it debt to fund projects.

Please let me explain.

Historically would expect that CIP projects have required various levels of debt. Some higher than the 1 to 1 ratio and some less. Some projects have an income producing side to them and as result need adjustment for higher equity value based on value of future income streams to justify additional debt. Others will have outside funding sources to support higher debt levels it. And last, some may have an emergency or urgency to replace infrastructure or damaged assets for essential community needs (i.e., Senior/Community Center) and need flexibility to fund higher debt levels to serve deemed essential needs.

As a result, using this new financial policy as a main qualifying factor (by project) could be short sided and

would leaving priority projects only partially funded. Furthermore, this new policy could lead to more projects

to seek needed funding via tax levies which is uncertain at best. This will burden City (Staff) resources to administer and may lead to increased voter fatigue for other levies affecting schools, fire districts, etc.,

creating negative outcomes.

Finally, I remind you, the City and Council asked for our community input, study & recommendation. After many

surveys, meetings, and review, your Stakeholder's gave thoughtful analysis and proposals with consideration for

City's finances. Obviously, the Stakeholders have a personal stake in making sure this Senior/Community Center

gets completed. Having said that, we also care about our community and its needs and hope the Council has a

similar vision as it relates to this project. Am sure you all agree that Redmond is a special place. This proposed

Redmond Senior/Community Center once completed, will be a cornerstone to the City's footprint and have

widespread use by ALL residents. Please don't put its outcome at risk with inflexible internal policies.

Again, please reconsider the financial policy you passed and amend it such that a special project like the Senior/

Community Center can move forward without the cloud of a future levy needed to fund the 42-million-dollar project.
