MOTION: Councilmember Birney moved to approve AM No. 18-115. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Carson.

Councilmember Anderson spoke regarding Item no. 5 in the staffing agreement and inquired about MLUE process. Members of the Council discussed the inclusion of the provision in the staffing agreement; the meaning of the provision; and the process. Future reporting on the success of permits was requested to be presented to the Council's Committee of the Whole meeting.

#### HEARINGS AND REPORTS

## PUBLIC HEARINGS

1. <u>AM No. 18-117</u>: Seritage Master Plan and Development Agreement Public Hearing Continuation

Mr. David Lee, Planner, reported regarding additional comments received for the record since the last segment of the continued public hearing. Mr. Lee overviewed the review cycle and decision criteria of the proposal and spoke regarding the technical review process.

Mr. Haney, at the request of Councilmember Fields, explained the reason why both a master plan and development agreement are quasijudicial.

Discussion ensued regarding an administrative memorandum of understanding on the project and any changes that have occurred since the memo was crafted and the current proposal. It was noted that the memorandum is non-binding.

Mayor Marchione resumed the continued public hearing at this time.

The following persons testified regarding AM No. 18-117: Mr. Tom Hinman; Ms. Sandra Eisert; Mr. James Bry (Applicant);

Ms. Rosemarie Ives; Mr. Jim Stanton (representing Microsoft); and Ms. Marlene Taylor Houtchens.

Members of the Council discussed:

- the criteria for approval of the action being based on the City Code;
- community space;
- a definition for "local businesses;"
- the number of charging stations that will be available in the development;
- traffic concerns;
- affordable commercial space and affordable housing;
- input from the City of Bellevue on the proposal; and
- the length of time from Phase I to completion of the project.

MOTION: Councilmember Anderson moved to continue the public hearing to a time certain of the August 21, 2018, regular business meeting. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Carson.

VOTE: The motion passed with Councilmembers Birney, Margeson, and Myers in opposition. (4-3)

Mr. David Lee spoke regarding next steps in the process and what the final package will look like when it is brought forward at the time of the next meeting.

Mr. Mark Freymuth, Fire Captain, provided a report of the 2017 Fire Operations Academy, noting participation by Councilmembers Birney and Fields. A video of the event was shared.

Mr. Drew Defazio, Battalion Chief, provided a report of the 2018 4th of July holiday, noting that the department responded to only a small number of easily addressed brush fires. Mild activity overall was reported for the holiday.
