2. AM No. 18-163: 2019-2020 Biennial Budget

Ms. Kelley Cochran, Financial Planning Manager, provided a staff report to the Members of the Council.

Ms. Jill Smith provided a staff report to the Members of the Council, explaining the Innovation Triangle, a three-city economic development model for technology. She further spoke regarding partnering with neighbors, and supporting small business startups.

Councilmember Fields stated that he would like to know how success is defined and measured.

Ms. Smith acknowledged the request and noted that formalization of the partnership is a budget offer in the 2019 - 2020 biennium.
